FARMERS MEETING—A meeting of stock-owners of Fernwood, held on the evening of March 6th, to consider the advisability of attempting to exterminate warble flies in that district. A detailed account of the life-history of these parasites was given and mention was made of the fact that they cause a loss of Canadian farmers of millions of dollars annually. It was decided to take immediate action to stamp out the warble menace by having all the herds in the community treated. The following resolution was also passed unanimously: Resolution on extermination of warble flies in this Province, cause a great loss to stock-owners annually and, whereas—Owing to the fact that these insects are being exterminated these here, or have them greatly reduced in numbers as has been done elsewhere, notably in Denmark and Iceland; and, whereas—To bring this about, requires the co-operation of our Provincial Government. Therefore—Be it resolved, that the farmers of Fernwood in the Fourth District of Prince, hereby respectfully ask our Legislature for assistance in this matter, and that this resolution be sent to the Premier, to our local representatives and to the Press.

STUDY CLUB—The Kensington-Associated Study Club held its regular monthly meeting in the town hall, Kensington, on Tuesday evening, Feb. 27. Owing to bad roads, only a few study groups were not represented but a good crowd was in attendance. In the absence of the President, Mr. Keir Duggan, Vice President took the chair. Meeting began with a general discussion on the "Four Progressive Steps in the Co-operative Movement" led by the chairman. These four steps are: 1. The Study Club; 2. Normal Co-operatives; 3. Co-operatives; 4. Producer Co-operatives. The discussion was lively and interesting. Those taking part were: Mrs. Jas. Pennington, Norman McDonald, Mr. J.S. Saunders and Mr. J.A. McKenzie. Following the discussion was an exercise entitled "Opinions", portraying findings and opinions in regard to the co-operative movement. Opinions expressed were as follows: Newfoundland Royal Commission relating to Co-operatives; J.S. Saunders; United Farmers of Ontario and Toronto, 1934; Kazawa, the great social worker in Japan, who is giving his life to Co-operatives; J.A. McKenzie; annual convention of Maritime Baptist Union, showing hearty support of Co-operatives; Dr. Richard Roberts, ex-moderator of United Church of Canada at a meeting in Toronto; Hon. R.B. Bennett in the House of Commons, discussing the address by the moderator, by Mrs. Fred Shea; Archer Wallace, associate editor of Pathfinder, outstanding United Young Peoples magazine, and a little summing up of the subject from St. Francis Xavier University by B.D. LeBlanc. Following the discussion Mr. C.G. Baker, M.L.A., gave a very interesting address on "The Problems of a Parliamentarian and what general situation could do to correct the situation. He pointed out that the political circles lead to corruption which hurts us all. The people themselves are responsible for this condition but do not seem to realize it. In a great number of cases the politicians' heads are tied. He showed how adult education could do a wonderful work and how Co-operatives could be made to influence the government in a general unifying movement. He heartily congratulated the Kensington Co-operatives on their splendid work. The address was greatly appreciated by all. The panel discussion on Co-operatives, scheduled to take place at the meeting, had to be postponed. The final item on the program was lantern slides on Finland, showing the success of the Co-operatives there.

WHERE TENNYSON LIVED

Farrington House, Fresh-water Bay, Isle of Wight, the home of Alfred Lord Tennyson for the last 39 years of his life, and which he purchased after his great success with the poem "Maud" is to be sold with the surrounding estate of about 235 acres.

It was at Farrington that the Poet Laureate did much of his work. He was visited there by such famous people as the Prince Consort, Jenny Lind, the "Swedish Nightingale," and Garibaldi. The last named planted in the grounds close to his house a Wellington—a Californian coniferous tree named after the Duke of Wellington—which still flourishes.

Above the house, on Highdown Cliffs, is a cross marking the spot to which Tennyson would frequently climb to enjoy the air on the downs. The house is mentioned in Crossing the Bar, which Tennyson wrote at the age of 81, when he spoke of

Groves of pine on either hand To break the blast of winter stand. Though he never wholly deserted Farrington, Tennyson acquired Aldworth Park, near Haslemere, and built a house there as a refuge from tourists who intruded on his privacy in the Isle of Wight. He himself laid the foundation stone of Aldworth in 1868 on Shakespeare's birthday, April 23rd. The inscription on the stone pleased him: "Prosper Thou the work of our hands, O prosper Thou our handiwork."

When the house was completed he took a particular delight in its "room, luxuriously equipped for Victorian times. At first he would indulge in four or five hot baths a day.

Tennyson enjoyed the walks around Aldworth, and the air cured his hay fever. But he still could not rid himself completely of the attentions of tourists. His bearded figure, blue cape and broad-brimmed wide-awake hat made him easily recognizable outside his own grounds. When he saw a tourist approaching him in his walks he would flee with as much haste as a Poet Laureate could assume with dignity.

Island Premier Makes Address At Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, March 8—(CP)—Premier Thane Campbell of Prince Edward Island today told a luncheon meeting of the Laurier Club here that if the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation obtains the balance of power in the next parliament it would lead to a coalition government.

Premier Campbell said that J. S. Woodsworth, the C. C. F. Leader, had urged the election of a sufficient number of supporters to vest in him a balance of power in the House of Commons.

C. C. F. would have nothing to do with Conservative Leader Manion's National Government but admittedly would join a Coalition if it obtained a balance of power, Mr. Campbell said.

The Premier asked what sort of a Government did Mr. Manion expect for efficient prosecution of the war if he called in C. C. F. members.

The C. C. F. held the idea that sending of a Canadian Expeditionary force overseas was merely a concession to the "vanity and personal ambition of a few brass hats" at Ottawa.

The Canadian people could reject the present Federal Government, with its known personnel and its known experience or the so-called National Government of Dr. Manion.

The selection of the National Government would depend on the sole judgement and dictation of the Conservative Leader himself, said Mr. Campbell.

"While not claiming for the Liberal Party the monopoly of a desire for national unity, I submit that no party or group of parties could be found in Canada with the record of achievement in that direction possessed by the present Government."

Mr. Campbell termed Prime Minister W. Mackenzie King and Justice Minister Levesque "two outstanding bulwarks of Canadian unity."

Col. Ralston Gives Statement

KINGSTON, Ont., March 8—(CP)—Hon. J. L. Ralston, federal minister of finance disclosed tonight that the first Canadian overseas division, went to England with a full outfit of light and heavy machine guns, 18 pounder field guns and medium guns in addition to rifles and personal equipment.

Answering opposition criticism directed at the equipment of troops now in England, the minister for the first time made public the quantity of arms sent with the Canadian troops. He spoke at a meeting in support of Hon. Norman Rogers, minister of National Defence and government candidate in Kingston.

Up to the present the only official information on the subject was the fact that the troops were fully equipped as to rifles, uniforms and accessories such as blankets, shaving kits and other gear.

In a short time, Mr. Ralston said, deliveries of Bren light machine guns will start from the John Inglis company at Toronto. Instead of 1,000 guns deliverable in the year starting April 1, the government will receive 2,000 from the Toronto plant as Bren guns become deliverable with which the division is now equipped and which are not obsolete.
