THE WAR SCARE NOW ABATING

No Need to Longer Pay War Risks to Port Arthur

Favorable Outlook for Peace—United States and France May include Bribery Among Extraditable Offences.

NO NEED TO PAY WAR RISKS.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—(Special.)—In connection with insurances against war risks effected on shipments of Welsh coal to Port Arthur for Russia, a telegram received today from St. Petersburg says there is no further necessity to insure against war.

HOW IT IS INTERPRETED.

This is interpreted as forecasting a favorable outcome of the negotiations between Russia and Japan.

TO EXTRADITE FOR BRIBERY.

PARIS, Oct. 26.—(Special.)—Carrying out instructions from Washington the United States Ambassador has begun negotiations for an additional clause in the Extradition Treaty to cover bribery.

COMBINE THAT HITS NAILERS

Steel Company Out of Canadian Market.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—Some time ago the Canadian nail manufacturers entered into an agreement with the United States Steel Co. to purchase all the wire rods they require from the company. As a return for this contract the steel company agreed to keep out of the Canadian nail market, and the depression in the German iron market enabled the Canadian manufacturers to buy under the steel company's price, and they promptly availed themselves of it. A day of reckoning came, however, and the offending manufacturers have now agreed to pay the steel company the amount they saved through their purchases in the German market, about \$2 per ton. The steel company will continue to keep out of the Canadian nail market.

THE COLLEGIATE CONVENTION

Concluded at Mount Allison, Sackville

Eloquent Address Delivered by George Irving, B. A., Montreal—Island Students in Attendance.

(Special Correspondence.)

Our last report of the Students' Convention in progress at Sackville concluded with the session of Friday morning. On the afternoon of the same day two subjects were opened up for discussion, "Opportunities for work outside the College Community" introduced and outlined by Mr. Green, Dalhousie; and the "Function of the Missionary Department" by Mr. Suttle, Mt. Allison. The discussion which was entered into by Mr. Marshall, Maritime Secy. Mr. Williams, International Secy.; and many others showed that very large possibilities for much more effective work in these two immense fields of service lay within the sphere of each college. The world at home and abroad is demanding strong, noble manhood to elevate its every department of life and especially ask the colleges looked to for supplying this demand.

The evening service was also of a missionary character, George Irving, Secy. McGill, Y. M. C. A. in clear and forceful language showed that the motto of the Student Volunteer Band should be the motto of every Christian "The evangelization of the world in this generation." The speaker citing the great expenditure of money for educational purposes and the ready response of men in times of war, contended that the overtly in the foreign field was not due to lack of men or money but lack of spiritual vision towards the larger investment of life. Mr. Irving expects shortly to sail for the foreign field. Professor Faulkner of Pine Hill, Halifax addressed the convention at the morning and evening sessions of Saturday on the subjects: "Necessity of Bible Study" and "The Authority of Christ." The former was a plain practical talk on reasons and methods for Bible study. The latter was the masterly handling of a masterly subject. We refrain from attempting any report on this address which should not be justly given in brief space. The professor is well known and to mention his name is sufficient guarantee of a good treat.

On Sunday morning Prof. Anderson of Mt. Allison preached the conventional sermon in the Methodist church taking as his text, Rev. 19, 12. "The Christ of many crowns." Three lines of thought engaged the mind of the speaker viz: Christ the bearer of the crown of intellect, of character, of love. The sermon which was heard by a very large audience was a splendid presentation of the theme, a veritable mine of rich and choice thought and was heartily enjoyed by all present. The afternoon meeting led by H. B. Williams bearing directly upon college life revealed the grand opportunities and possibilities for effective work in the midst of so much young and promising life. The firewell service held Sunday evening marked not only the termination of the convention but the most impressive service of the series. Addresses were given by Prof. Faulkner, Mr. Williams, Mr. Gilkey, Secretary for preparatory school. All the important points of the Convention were given special emphasis and valuable suggestions for the successful prosecution of the work in the colleges were offered. To those present the Convention proved a season of rich spiritual blessing, but the true success attained can only be calculated from the results that shall be revealed as the years roll around in our college life. As a note of interest to our Island friends we may mention the names of some of the Island boys in attendance. As delegates from Dalhousie, Mr. Seaman, Charlottetown, Mr. McKenzie of Flat River and Mr. Green; from Acadia, A. W. Warren Tyne Valley and D. J. McPherson, Murray Harbor Road; at Mt. Allison, there are several, J. A. Sellar, Charlottetown; E. S. Weeks, Fredericton; Roy Long, Tyne Valley; Mr. Morris, Bradalbane, Mt. Irving, whose address was such a distinguished feature of the conference, is a son of D. P. Irving, Vernon River Bridge.

DEATH CAME TO HIM SUDDENLY

Henry A. Harvie Found at His Office Sample Rooms

Heart Failure was the Cause of His Demise Yesterday Afternoon—Had Been in Failing Health for Some Years.

The sudden death took place yesterday afternoon about half past four o'clock of Henry A. Harvie, a respected citizen of Charlottetown and the proprietor of the Sample Rooms at the corner of Queen and Sydney streets.

The deceased had been around town in his usual health during the morning and the afternoon. Shortly after four o'clock he went up to his office at the Sample Rooms. Adjoining is the room occupied by J. T. Gallagher, the representative of Manchester Robertson and Allison. Mr. Gallagher heard a groan and a thud but thinking it was from the waterrooms downstairs paid no attention.

A few moments later a newsboy went upstairs with the evening papers and found Mr. Harvie lying upon the floor. Just at that moment Arthur Gates and E. Y. Rowland arrived to discover that Mr. Harvie was dead. Drs. Johnson and Warburton were summoned and upon examination found that death was due to heart failure.

The deceased had been in failing health for several years and two winters ago was in the P. E. I. Hospital where at one time he was very low. Since then he has had recurrences of heart disease and was aware that the end might at any time come suddenly as it did yesterday afternoon.

The body was taken to the undertaking rooms of C. E. Davison and then removed to the home of his daughter Mrs. W. W. Stanley.

The late Mr. Harvie was for many years a prominent bookseller of Charlottetown and was at one time in partnership with Hon. David Laird. He was quiet, unassuming and universally respected by all with whom he was acquainted. Three sons and three daughters are left to mourn. They are Harry in Montreal, Wendall in Johannesburg, S. A., Will in the Northwest Mounted Police, Mrs. W. W. Stanley, Mr. H. R. Boswell and Miss Jennie in Charlottetown, to all of whom the Guardian extends its sincere sympathy.

Despite the unfavorable weather a large attendance witnessed the third game of the football League series at the C. A. A. Grounds yesterday. In this match the Saint Dunstan's met the Victorias for the first time, and the wonderful play put up by the White and Blue was a credit to themselves and a surprise to their followers. The Collegians appeared with their regular team with the exception of Andy Doyle, who through illness was replaced by Cameron. The Victorias have made sweeping changes since their defeat by the Abegweits, and yesterday their fifteen played a marvellous game.

In the first half the Collegians were repeatedly worsted, and the ball constantly remained in their territory. Several times did play reach the Saints' five yard line, and they were once compelled to rouge. Their forwards however were much superior in scrim formations and were always successful in healing out. Despite this gains were rarely made by the Red and White half line, who were almost invariably brought down by quarters Gorham and Brown, whose work in their positions was of a high class order.

The Saint Dunstan's changed matters in the second half and played a more aggressive game throughout.

By a pretty run from the twenty-five yard line Sam Doyle scored the first try, and a few minutes later Donahoe repeated the performance. Neither of the tries was converted. Before time was called the Victorias worked the ball down to the Saints 25 yards but could not score, the game thus ending 0-0 in favor of the Collegians.

DOWIE'S COACH SEIZED FOR DEBT

By a Lawyer Who Defended One of His Followers

The Pierson Case—Court Imposes Fine of \$500 for Neglecting to Call Medical Attendance when Needed.

DOWIE'S COACH SEIZED.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—(Special.)—Dowie's coach was seized today for the claim of a lawyer who defended J. Luther Pierson, a former Zionist convicted of allowing his step-daughter to die without medical attendance.

HOW THE CASE AROSE.

Pierson had been a follower of Dowie and was himself described as a "divine healer." Dowie as "General Overseer of the Christian Catholic Church" at first began to furnish funds to carry the appeal to a higher court; but Pierson afterward renounced Dowie and the latter thereupon refused to furnish further funds for legal purposes.

A FINE OF \$500 IMPOSED.

The appellate court confirmed the conviction of the lower court imposing a fine of \$500 upon Pierson.
