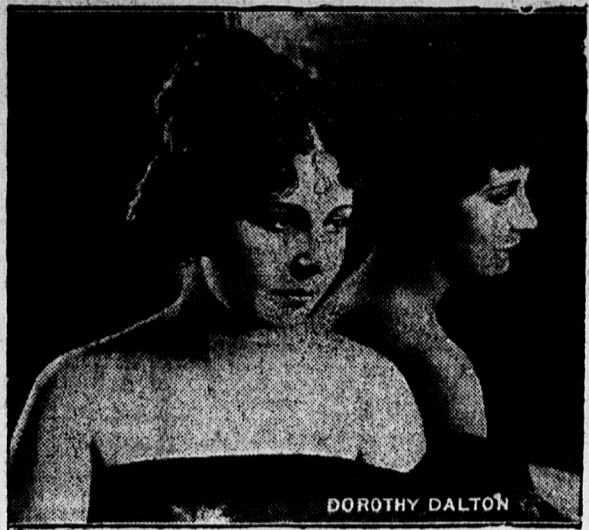

Germany Still Refuses To Pay PARIS, Mar. 24.—Germany in her reply to a recent ultimatum to Allied reparations commission refused to pay one billion marks of gold due on this date and disputes the commission's figures showing a balance of twelve billion marks due on May 1. It is maintained that the German note that twenty billion marks, which the peace treaty provided should be handed over on May 1. There have been more than paid. The note asks that a joint committee of experts fix the value of German deliveries on operations account but it declares that in any event it would be impossible for Germany to pay twelve billion marks by the first.

Willard Dares Dempsey To Post \$30,000 For Bout

LAWRENCEVILLE, Kan., Mar. 23.—Jess Willard declares emphatically that he will not meet Fred Fulton or any of the runners-up for the heavyweight championship prior to his bout with Jack Dempsey on Labor Day. He added:

"If I cannot face Dempsey I won't fight again. I'm a former champion. The boxing public did not ask Jeffries, Corbett or Fitzsimmons to go out and make a return when they wanted return bouts. I'm not broke and do not need the money."

"I am after Dempsey alone," continued Willard. "They stepped out on me at New York. I didn't make Dempsey and his manager put up any money for the March 17th date. They took advantage of that to run out to the coast for a movie contract. It was lots softer for the champion."

"Dempsey's manager said I ran out of New York. I am ready to put up \$30,000 in cash for my appearance on Labor Day. I dare Dempsey to do the same. The public will soon find out who took the 'powder'."

London-Paris Air Service Resumed

Passenger Fare Only Little More Than Required in Ordinary Routes

PARIS, March 23.—After an interruption of several months, British aircraft companies have resumed passenger service and parcel traffic between London and Paris. Following the French company, which has maintained service throughout the winter, fares have been very much reduced, and the single fare either way is now three hundred francs, which is not very much dearer than the ordinary rail and steamboat fare. For this summer's traffic, which is expected to be heavy, several new improvements are being worked out along the route. At both the terminal airdromes, ten mile electric fires are being installed to enable the pilots to have a sure indication of their direction in case they should become benighted. On the French side it has just been decided to use a system of captive balloons to give direction in case of fog or mist between Paris and the coast. When the weather is clear, these balloons will not be used, but in case of a ground mist they will be sent up to heights of 2,500 feet and will act as buoys in the sea channel to guide the pilot across the mist-hidden land. As a trial, three of these balloon stations are being operated, but later, if it is found useful and necessary, more will be added till the whole route is plainly marked out at whatever height flying is possible above the fog and the clouds.

TRAINS TO RUN ON OLD TIME

Daylight saving time has not been adopted and will not be adopted by the railways of Canada this year, so far as is known at present. A special federal enactment would be necessary before railways could make this change in time and such an enactment has not been asked for. This statement was issued by the Railway Association of Canada to clear up a misunderstanding which arose out of an appeal issued by the railways to various municipalities, asking them if they did adopt daylight saving time to make it effective all at one time. The railways suggested that this should be May 1, and October 1, as these are the dates on which the railways make their usual spring and autumn time tables changes.
