### Two Police Shot

DUBLIN, May 10.—Constables Clark and Murdock were shot and killed today by Sinn Feiners at Clonmany, Donegal. It is reported that their bodies afterward were thrown into the sea.

### ACCUSE THIS INSURANCE COMPANY OF ENCOURAGING RACE SUICIDE

PARIS, May 11.—An insurance company which announced a schedule of "marriage risks" may be suppressed by the French Government on the ground that it encourages race suicide. The company offered to insure any young girl from the age of 16 up, for a few sous a day "against marriage". If the girl found no husband when she reached 35 years of age the company agreed to pay her a monthly income, meant to take the place of the earning powers of a husband. Another plan insured young brides against desertion by their husbands. Government investigators pronounced against the plan, because they said many girls would prefer to take the certain income at 35 rather than run the uncertain risks of marriage.

### Propellor Broken

HALIFAX, May 10.—The Atlantic transport freighter Montauk has lost a propellor blade three hundred miles off Halifax, and is making for the port under her own steam, according to a wireless received by A. G. Jones & Company, her agents here. The Montauk is due tomorrow.

### SAYS EPISCOPACY IS WORST FEATURE OF ANGLICAN FAITH

LONDON, May 10.—The general Assembly of the Anglican Church in session here, appointed delegates to convene with a committee of the Anglican Church on the proposals for church union. Doctor Carnegie Simpson, in moving the matter said he greatly admired the Anglicans and coveted many things they had, but he did not approve of the Episcopacy, which was the weakest and in his opinion the worst feature of the Anglican faith. The general assembly decided to admit women to elderships and deaconships but resolved that where women were admitted to the ministry they should resign if they entered the state of matrimony.

## Another Grave Situation In The Coal Strike

LONDON, May 10.—A new grave situation in regard to the coal strike has arisen from a ban of the Transport Workers Federation on handling foreign coal brought to England and a decision of the Railwaymen's Union to refuse to haul the coal. While the executive committee of the National Union Railwaymen are not supporting the threat of the Transport Federation and Railwaymen, it is said the Government is determined to secure the coal desired for public utilities and will employ volunteer labor for this purpose if necessary, which it is considered will be likely to cause a strike on the part of the railwaymen.
