

# Mel Ott To Manage New York Giants

## Veteran Of Team Gets Two Year Contract As Bill Terry Moves Up To Front Office

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 2.—(AP)—New York Giants unexpectedly moved Bill Terry into the front office today and named Mel Ott playing manager in a surprise shift calculated to restore the decrepit Giants to a dominant position in the National League.

Terry was made General Manager of the farm system and scouting staff and given general advisory powers in the direction of the club while Ott, 32-year-old rightfielder, was rewarded for 16 years of faithful service by giving him charge of the team on the field.

### Four-for-one Deals headache To Dutton

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—(CP)—Hockey's Slimmer. Another of these four-for-one deals has turned out on Red Dutton. Two years ago Red gave up Sweeney Schirmer for Buster Jackson, Chuck Connors, Buzz Bell, and Doc Romnes. The Doc retired almost immediately, Connacher and Jackson have checked out and only Bell remains while Schirmer is an important cog in the Toronto machine. This year Dutton traded Louie Carr for Gus Marker, Peanuts O'Flaherty, Red Hergen and Nick Knott. Carr has been a hit with the Leafs while yesterday Dutton announced the demotion of Hergen, O'Flaherty and Earl Robertson to Springfield and the recall of goalie Charlie Rayner, and Edwards Norm Larson and Bus Wechery. The other part of the deal, Marker, has been out for weeks with a broken wrist and Knott hasn't shown much. Another four-for-one was Eddie Wiseman and \$5,000 to the Bruins for Edie and \$5,000 to the Bruins for Edie was not unexpected. President Horace Stoneham said Terry will be available to help Ott if the quiet little veteran wants any, but declared direction of the ball club now is up to Ott.

Both Terry and Ott were given two-year contracts. Terry, who had managed the Giants since succeeding John McGraw in the middle of the 1932 season, was believed to have taken a cut in salary from \$42,500 to about \$30,000 in order to persuade Stoneham to create the job which Terry long had coveted. Terry's former contract which had another year to run was cancelled. Ott was believed to have been given a salary of about \$25,000.

Outlining the aims of the new administration Terry asserted, "I'm delighted by the new setup and I think this will enable us to make the Giants a strong club again. This is the work I have been wanting to do and I feel sure that I can give Mel some ball players that will be a great deal better than what I have had to work with recently."

Ott came to the Giants in 1925 before he was 16 years old and while the club was managed by John McGraw. He was a catcher but McGraw placed him in the outfield and later Terry was forced to use him at third base. He is the leading home run hitter of the National League with a total of 415, a league record to his credit. Last season he hit 27 homers while batting .296 but until this year he had a lifetime batting average of .313.

### See paradise For Hunters

THE PAS, Man., Dec. 2.—(CP)—T.C. Main, president of Ducks Unlimited (Canada) sees this town, 500 miles northwest of Winnipeg as the "greatest hunters' headquarters in Western Canada," providing water levels of the area are brought back to normal.

The Pas area "is one of the greatest potential hunting grounds on this continent with fish, ducks and geese plentiful," Mr. Main said. "This country is great but I do not think the people here realize the value it has as a central point for hunters and fishermen. We urged the Board of Trade here to build up necessary hunting accommodations to develop northern 'cocks', and to encourage coming of Indian and Metis guide stations."

Declaring Northern Manitoba could be one of the greatest tourist attractions in the Dominion, Mr. Main said. "In my talks, when mention of The Pas is made, I find a large number of interested hunters eager for more details on the north country. They want details of where and how they can organize hunting parties, the best areas, and the methods of travel. I also meet a number of people who are interested in the north from the scenic angle."

He was known throughout the boxing world as the author of boxing annuals, which were among the most authoritative ever produced. On two occasions he took boxing squads to Australia.

### Bruins Trim Leafs 3-1 In Overtime To Take Over League Leadership

BOSTON, Dec. 2.—(CP)—After trailing for more than 51 minutes Boston Bruins overtook a terrific closing drive tonight to gain a 3-1 overtime victory over Toronto Maple Leafs and undisputed possession of top spot in the National Hockey League. An overflow crowd of 15,000 watched the game.

The short-handed Maple Leafs, shared the top rung with the Bruins at the outset, scored early in the first period and then choked the determined Boston attack until Dutch Hiller nullified Bingo Kampman's opening tally with less than nine minutes to go.

Although both teams, in action for the third time in four nights, were tiring, the Bruins managed to continue their furious efforts until they pulled the victory out of the fire.

Little Eddie Wiseman registered the winning goal, during the seventh minute of overtime after Bill Cowley had lured goalie Turk Broda out of position, and 34 seconds later Red Hamill insured the Bruins' uphill triumph by rapping in a 20-foot shot after rushing with Art Jackson and Bobby Bauer.
