The Montreal Witness says that when in opposition Sir Louis Davies "had the reputation of being the best half hour speaker in the House of Commons."

During the year 1900 the losses from fire in the United States reached the vast total of \$100,929,865. Thus property to the value of over three millions of dollars was sent to the fash-heap on an average per week of the year, or not far short of half a million dollars per day. The insurance companies covered about 95 millions of this loss, leaving 66 millions to fall upon the uninsured or partially insured owners.

Boston Advertiser points out that the pluck and endurance of the Boers have had no parallel since the days of the Revolutionary War in America. And the American people had the assistance of France, as the Advertiser intimates, while the Boers are utterly without hope or prospect of assistance from any quarter. It takes a very severe course of remonstrance to convince the Boers that they ought to submit, but they will be so very thoroughly convinced in the end that we may hope they will rest quietly under British rule for all time to come.

The Edmonton, N. W. T. Board of Trade have addressed to the Attorney General at Regina, a memorial setting forth that the time has come for the Territories to be raised to the status of Provinces and they suggest that this shall be done by creating two Provinces divided from east to west by the 52nd parallel. This would place Assiniboia and Southern Alberta in one Province, while Saskatchewan and Northern Alberta would form the other Province. This division would seem not to be a very desirable one, except for the southern Province, which would be intersected throughout its great length by the Canadian Pacific Railway. When the time comes for the Territories to be advanced in status there will probably be three Provinces created instead of two, their boundaries corresponding somewhat with the existing territorial divisions.

In Ballarat, Victoria, a city of some 45,000 inhabitants, the Duke of Cornwall on May 18th laid the foundation stone for a monument to the Australian soldiers who have fallen in the South African war. The memorial is to take the form of an equestrian statue in bronze and the estimated cost is over \$10,000. The Victoria Age tells of the brief and graceful ceremony:

Around the railings had been hung garlands and flowers and many emblems, while above floated the decorative banners of the city. In the cleared space a square excavation had been made, and within the excavation, and partially filling it, lay the foundation stone. The public were present in tens of hundreds yesterday, and crowded eagerly up against the barriers as the Duke and Duchess, with the Governor-General and Countess of Hopetoun, advanced within the enclosed area. To the Duke of York the task was very plainly a congenial one. He stepped down by the side of the stone, measured it with his eye, and tapped it here and there with a hammer, chatting all the time with Mr. Baker, the architect of the statue that is to be. Then when the formalities had been complied with his Highness declared the stone to be well and truly laid. As he made the announcement the crowd raised a cheer of congratulation that could be heard half way over Ballarat. Their Highnesses, after being presented with the trowel with which the ceremony had been carried out, bowed their acknowledgements, entered their carriage and drove on their way.

OTTAWA'S PROPOSITION.
