MRS ELLEN MCFADDEN

There passed away at her home in Tignish on October 4, the soul of Mrs. Ellen McFadden at the ripe age of 85 years. Mrs. McFadden was the daughter of the late Patrick McHugh of Norway, Lot 1 and widow of the late James McFadden of Wilmot, N. S. who was a veteran of the civil war in 1863 and who came to Prince Edward Island shortly after the war.

This meeting and marrying Ellen McHugh deceased, and living there up to the time of his death in 1890.

Mrs. McFadden had six sons William and James who predeceased her several years ago, also Private Francis J. who served in the great War enlisting in Port Arthur in 1916 with the 141 Battalion. From there he went to England where he was transferred to the 82nd Battalion, then on to France where he gallantly fought in the trenches receiving a severe gun shot wound in the left side, and whose untimely death took place in December 1927 in Winnipeg at the early age of 43 years.

Mrs. McFadden had been in failing health for some years and was bed-ridden the last eight months, although she received the best medical family could give during her last illness and all the care a devotedness.

Mrs. McFadden was frequently visited by her pastor, Rev. G. I. McLellan who administered to her the last rites of the Catholic Church.

There is also left to mourn three daughters Mrs. Emma Villard of Tignish, Mrs. J. V. McIssac of Boston, Mass. and Mae at home. Also three sons Frederick, Charles and George of Winnipeg. Also four brothers William Peter and Thomas McHugh Norway and Daniel of St. John N. B.

The funeral took place from her late residence to the Church of St. Simon and St. Jude Rev. Father McLaughlin officiating at church and grave. The Pall Bearers were Martin P. Doyle John J. Nelligan of Norway, Lot 1, Capt James McGrath, Edward McGrath Leo J. Murphy and J. Albert Brennan of Tignish. The entire sympathy of the community goes out to the beloved family.

BRITAIN DOMINANT IN REALM OF AIR

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The Aero Show has been well timed. After the thrills of the air pageant the public imagination has been fired to an extent which will make it gladly dip a hand into its pocket again for the privilege of seeing at close range the machines on which men can now do so much, and of estimating the extent to which our international rivals are to be feared in the matter of efficiency and design. On the latter point there will be many revelations at Olympia of the supremacy of Britain.

Whether it be in the popularizing of types of machines where passenger and pilot sit side by side, or the presentation of light midgest airplanes costing a mere 300 pounds, the country is in the vanguard of this enterprise, and the exhibitors, from the Air Ministry downwards, are sparing no pains to make this point clear.

WORK ON NEW HOTEL—At the present time the site of the new C. N. R. Hotel on the corner of Kent and Pownal Streets is the scene of greatest activity. The work of excavation begun yesterday morning, is being carried out with great expedition. A large Erie steam shovel is at work in conjunction with six powerful motor trucks which carry away the excavated material. Lights have been installed to illuminate the site that work may be carried on after dark. Last evening work was carried on till 10 o'clock. The personification of efficiency seems present in every detail of the work. Trucks running in a continual circuit are filled promptly with two enormous scoops of earth, and while the work of excavation goes on the old K. of C. Home is being dismantled as if by magic. The earth is being transported to the West Kent School grounds where it has been piled several feet deep over the area to be resurfaced. It is expected that the school lot will be completely covered by tonight.

Messrs L. R. Allen, M. L. A. of Summerside, Geo. Brown, of Margate and Dr. L. M. Calbeck of Crapaud were appointed a resolution committee to draw up resolutions to be submitted at a later meeting. The enrollment of members then took place, and all present, twenty seven in number joined the association and paid the membership fee. The meeting then adjourned to convene at the call of the Secretary.

Mr. L. R. Allen, M. L. A. said he was not sure whether it was possible for the provincial government to place an embargo on United States mink but he thought the Dominion Government could do so. The Provincial Government might have the power to keep them out for six months. Some form of registration papers with the government seal on them would be the best guarantee that shipments from the Island would be genuine.

Matters in general were discussed, the most important one being the question whether the association should be Dominion or Provincial. It was generally conceded that it would be better to keep the Association within the province for the present at any rate, especially as the Norwegian government would allow only Island mink to be brought into Norway which was their largest market.

OLD ENGLISH PLAYS

STRONG IN PARIS
PARIS, Nov. 23. (By Josephine Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent.)—After three centuries and despite all the competition of revue and talkie, Ben Jonson and Shakespeare still play to crowded houses in Paris. Both these old rivals of the Elizabethan stage have undergone some modification in their French dress, but in "Volpone" and the "Merry Wives" they are as successful as to lead Rene Clair, one of the younger producers, to declare: "The tide has turned in favor of the legitimate stage again. The cinema never could draw the crowd away from the play like 'Volpone.'"

And "Volpone" is playing cheek by jowl with the modern thriller of Montmartre. One has to climb the famous hill to find it, pass round the Palace Pigalle and by the Moulin de la Galette to the most sophisticated square in the world. There above the doorway of the Theatre de l'Atelier electric lights pick out the words "Volpone"—Ben Jonson. Just across the way is one of the biggest talkie houses in Paris.

It is a typical Parisian crowd that one finds in the Atelier. Not a seat empty. Girls whose trim figures drove the tight skirt and long sloping jumper from the world of fashion. Art students—Independents, True Independents and Super Independents with their studios in Montmartre. Young dramatic critics, frequenters of night clubs. And foreigners sprinkled here and there about the theatre, not so numerous now as earlier in the year.

The producer of the "Merry Wives" has had the diverting idea of producing it in a modern setting. The repartee is translated into an up-to-date argot and the bubbling humor set to music. So one is rather puzzled at times to know whether it is an operetta set in picturesque Windsor or an Elizabethan comedy. Like "Volpone" it is running a triumphal course.

So while modern dramatists anxiously scan the horizon to see what new disaster may come from across the sea, the hardy Elizabethans score two successes of the year before the footlights of Paris.

EXPEDITION TO BATTLEFIELDS OF FRANCE

(By M. McIntyre Hood, Canadian Press Special Representative)—RE-GINA, Sask., Nov. 26.—The possibility of staging a great pilgrimage of Canadian ex-service men to the battlefields of France and Belgium in the summer of the year 1932 will be one of the interesting subjects which will come under discussion at the third dominion convention of the Canadian Legion, being held here from Nov. 25 to 28. This subject was given some thought at the last dominion convention held in June, 1928 at Saint John, N. B., but no definite action was then taken.

This year however there is a strong incentive to the sponsoring by the Canadian Legion of such a pilgrimage in the summer of 1932 it is expected the dedication ceremony will be held and this is the occasion for which it is planned to organize the pilgrimage which will take tens of thousands of Canadian soldiers back to the battlefields over which they fought their way from 1915 to 1918. The proposals which the legion will consider at the convention, include not only the organization of the pilgrimage, but also the planning of ways and means whereby it will be possible to arrange for the transportation of the maximum number of ex-service men overseas at the minimum expense.

LAST WEEK'S SMALLEST PENSION

LONDON, Nov. 27.—A native of Surrey claims the distinction of drawing the smallest pension in the world—3d. a week. He is Charles Pearce, of Onslow village, Guildford, a white-haired, very moustached old figure, and every Saturday he may be seen waiting in the queue at the Southern Railway pay office in Guildford to receive his weekly 3d.

Mr. Pearce readily explained the situation to a "Daily Express" representative.

"Oh yes," he said, "it is true that I draw a pension of 3d. a week, but it is not really as funny as it sounds. I worked for forty years on the South-Western Railway, and when I retired I became entitled to a pension of 10s. 3d. a week. Two years later I qualified for the old-age pension, and my railway pension was automatically reduced to 10s., but I continue to draw my 3d. a week, though it costs me 2d. to go and collect it."

He explained that it was, of course, not the prospect of the remaining penny that made him bother to fetch his 3d.

"I remain on the books of the railway company so long as I continue to draw my pension," he declared, "and can consequently claim one free pass a year on the Southern Railway and privilege ticket—that is, tickets at quarter fare for myself and family when we wish to travel."

Mr. Pearce has been married twice, and although he is seventy-two, he has two children under fourteen.
