Bishop Potter of New York professes to still believe that the subway tavern which he opened a year ago with religious services and which recently came to grief represents a good way of conducting the liquor traffic. Temperance men and drinking men appear to agree that the Bishop is wrong. Religion and strong drink will not mix unless both are very much diluted.

It is said it will require a full year for Russia to bring home the troops and supplies she has sent to the far east. The tales these returned soldiers will have to tell to their fellow countrymen will not be likely to inspire the latter with any desire for another war with Japan. It will be in this way that the masses of Russia will get their first real insight into what has occurred during the past two years.

Down in Mexico where the railway conductors were not all as honest as they ought to be, the plan has been introduced of compelling the conductor to give the passenger a lottery ticket as a receipt for any passage money paid. These lottery tickets give the possessor the alleged chance to win anywhere from \$2.50 to \$1,000. The theory is that the passenger will insist on getting his lottery ticket with his railway passage, and will of course test his luck at the next lottery drawing, thus affording the authorities a check upon each conductor's receipts. How it will work out remains to be seen. A state that raises revenue from public lotteries must needs keep a close watch over the honesty of its officials.

The new treaty between Great Britain and Japan, taking the place of the present treaty which had yet two years to run, is not so limited in duration, and it binds each nation to aid the other against one assailant instead of two. The difference between the alliances is enormous. The second assumes that the normal relation between the two powers is one of both defensive and offensive alliance. With any great power except Japan this might prove a source of danger to Britain, but for a long time to come the Japanese will not contemplate war with any country except Russia, and with her only if she becomes the assailant. The mere existence of this treaty, and the certainty that an attack on Japan would bring Britain at once into the war, will tend to keep Russia from being aggressive.

Though the United States wheat crop his heavy, the export has so far been light notwithstanding the poor crops in Russia and India. This is accounted for by the rapid increase in the home consumption in the Republic. From 1900 to 1905 the crop fluctuated from 547,000,000 to 748,000,000 bushels. The highest point was reached in 1902, while the crop of 1905 was only five millions greater than that of 1902. The export, which for four years averaged 200,000,000 bushels, sank to 130,000,000 millions in 1904, and to 44,000,000 in 1905. On the other hand, the domestic consumption increased from 361,000,000 in 1900 to 511,000,000 in 1904, and this increase was steady, the occasional decreases being very slight. The time is apparently approaching when the home consumption will permanently overtake the production and the United States will then no longer count as an exporter of wheat.

We do not know just how much British influence may have had to do with the forbearance of Japan, but we do know that the new alliance with Great Britain is worth a good deal more to Japan than an indemnity of \$1,000,000,000. The situation is so good in every respect that there is a temptation to describe it in superlatives. Japan has all the substantial advantages that she could have hoped to gain, added to a definite alliance with Great Britain.

Not much that is new can now be said on the subject of Protection and Prices, which is the title of a neat volume of 300 pages just received at this office. The author is Watson Griffin, a well known protectionist writer. We are told that this is the third edition of the book and that 138,000 copies have been issued. Probably not all of these have been sold. There is an energetic protectionist propaganda going on, revived in view of the approaching revision of the tariff, and the distribution of this volume is no doubt intended to strengthen the campaign. The book is attractively illustrated by Samuel Hunter and no doubt will be read with interest by a goodly number who may not be quite sure of its economical soundness.

RUSSIAN EMPEROR TO HIS ARMY

General Linevitch Instructed to Convey Peace News to Russian Army.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 4.—The Emperor on Friday last telegraphed the following to General Linevitch.

"The negotiations at Portsmouth led on August 19 to a refusal of the demands of the Japanese Government regarding the cessation of the Island of Sakhalin, the payment of a war indemnity, the surrender of our ships lying in neutral harbors, and limitation of our forces in the Far East. After further negotiations Japan on August 20 yielded all our conditions, but asked for the return of that portion of Sakhalin occupied by Japanese troops.

The self-sacrificing army so dear to me withstood the assault of a numerically superior enemy in Manchuria, step by step during eighteen months, obstinately repulsing his advances. Under your leadership the army has been reorganized and strengthened by the arrival of troops from Russia and it is now greater in numbers and stronger than before. It is now prepared to ward off the enemy, also to inflict on him an important defeat.

"I and all Russia believe in the strength of my glorious army and its readiness to sacrifice itself for the good of the Fatherland, but by my duty to the people entrusted to me by God, commands me not to expose them again to the endless horrors of war.

"I have therefore accepted the preliminary peace conditions. The Russian troops, however, proved during this conflict their valor and self sacrifice. Convey this to my dear army. Make it known that I and Russia value the sacrifices which it has made in this severe war."

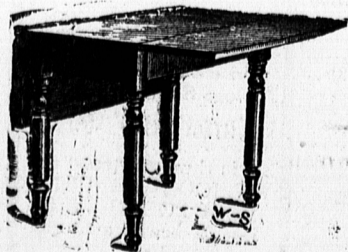
