Many friends are sorry to learn of the departure of Mack McDonald who left a few days ago for Boston. He will be greatly missed by his neighbors and friends. Miss Florrie Trowsdale has returned home after a visit to Bradalbanac. Frank Nicholson and George Trowsdale have returned home after a week's visit in Stancheil.

The customs officials at the port of Montreal, Toronto, St. John, Charlottetown and Hamilton have petitioned the Minister of Customs to have their salaries put on the same basis as officials of the same class at Ottawa. On the 17th a convention of Customs officials will be held at Hamilton and delegates will be there representing all the frontier ports. This convention will probably send a delegate to Ottawa to lay their views before the Hon. Mr. Patterson. The Post-master General and the Minister of Inland Revenue have promised their respective officials that their request for better salaries will be granted. A CORRESPONDENT writing to The Guardian from Mesher's Green, Halifax Co., says:—Quite a large contingent from this place attended the late Exhibition at Charlottetown, and everyone speaks in highest praise of the way they were used. They travelled some thirty miles out in the country districts buying horses, and are in love with the place. They say they are going back next year if they are alive and well and will try to see more of the country. They claim that the hotel accommodation is excellent and the charges moderate. One thing that particularly drew their attention was the market facilities as compared with Halifax. In that old city at the present day you may see the market people strung along Bedford Row and around the Post Office building with nothing to shield them from rain or snow. There on Saturdays you may see whites and blacks huddled on the sidewalks with their baskets and bundles of truck exposed for sale. They cross the ferry on the first boats that run, and often spend the whole day in the open air, and the majority of them are women, some quite old. These have followed the business from childhood and they never miss going to market when Saturday comes around. Such a condition of affairs is a disgrace to any city, and old Halifax in particular. Those market people who have been catering to the Halifax public for so many years, often at the cost of impaired health, most of them suffering from rheumatism and kindred diseases deserve something better in the shape of a market than the streets and sidewalks of the city.
