ONE MAN

On a fine day, in the city of London, an ordinary looking man was seen standing on the sidewalk gazing intently in the direction of an upper window in a certain building. A passer-by, noting the intensity of the gaze, stopped and began to investigate with equal intensity. Others, attracted by the mystery, also stopped to investigate and in a few minutes the sidewalk was blocked. The crowd overflowed into the street. Traffic was stopped and many were injured in the crush. Whispers of murder, an accident, an escaped convict, a German spy and other reports circulated through the frenzied crowd and everybody wanted to get a glimpse of the murderer or the convict or the spy.

It afterwards transpired that the man who was the cause of the crush on the sidewalk had done it on a wager that, inside of ten minutes, without saying a word or doing anything extraordinary, he could hold up the street traffic. He won the wager.

It is said that the recent Spanish-American war was brought about by the efforts of one man who undertook to inflame public opinion by persistent effort through newspapers ready to fall in with anything sensational and therefore saleable. The truth of this assertion might be difficult to establish but we know that, whether true or not in this case, the achievement would be quite possible.

The other day, a man threw a pet cat cruelly across the street in New York. A woman took up the cat's

cause, a man backed the woman up and a riot followed in which heads were broken and several men and women taken to the hospital.

Without multiplying instances the moving power of one man through persistent agitation can be easily demonstrated. History is full of such instances and many of the turning points, upward or downward, in the path of human progress can be traced to the actions of some one individual.

Some years ago the idea was promulgated that Germany had designs upon England. The idea, it is said and there is a good deal to substantiate it, originated with certain manufacturers interested in the building of ships and the making of improved guns. How it has grown may be learned from a glance at the naval appropriations of both Germany and England. The original idea has been fostered most sedulously by the few interested, until it has grown into a veritable war scare, while the great mass of German and English people look upon the very thought of such a war as the crowning sin of the ages and an absolute impossibility.

To-day Canada, a very small fraction of it, is working the war scare to further certain political interests. By persistent effort and appeals to passion and prejudice, racial, political and national, the scare can be developed into proportions that will eventually be as ridiculous as that which occurred on the London sidewalk. Is it worthy of Canadians? Think it over.

D., before the Conservation Commission at Ottawa, last June, when dealing with the oyster question, will be interesting:

"The government could originate a campaign of education for fishermen, farmers, culturists, overseers, traders, shippers or others concerned, with regard to the best methods to be used as well as give a demonstration of how to conduct the operations and to prove their value.

In an Agricultural College for Prince Edward Island oyster culture might well occupy a prominent place in the curriculum.

Is it not time that the province, through its progressive government, should make an effort to make use of this splendid gift which, in its present condition, meets neither the intention of the giver nor the hopes of those to whom it was given.

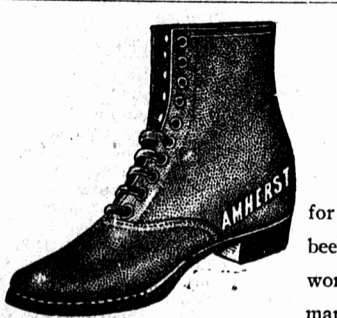

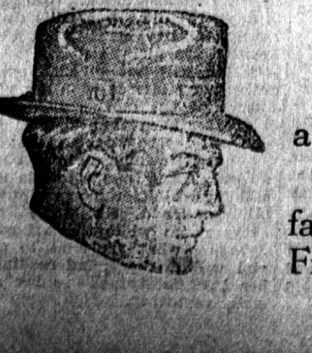
