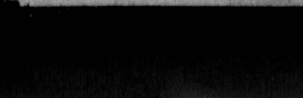


That third counter was "very handy" Cronin—at-a-boy!

NO IT DOESN'T TAKE MUCH TO WIN A TITLE

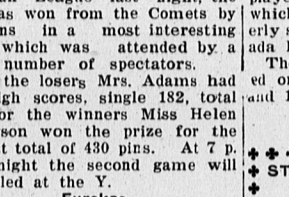
