Miss Florine Findley de Hart, of Virginia, has been chosen as the fairest of the fair in one of America's national beauty contests.



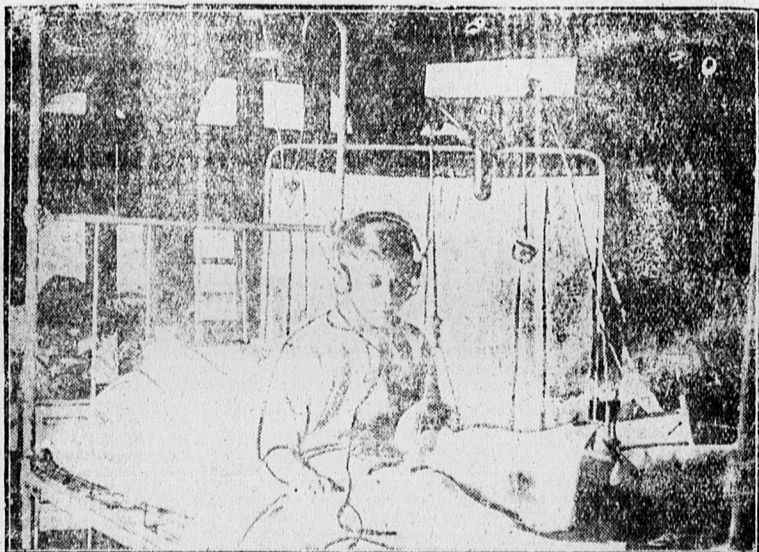
Mme. Margaret Winthrop, Metropolitan Opera star, and her daughter sailed recently for abroad.



The board walk at Sunnyside has become the fashion parade ground of Toronto.



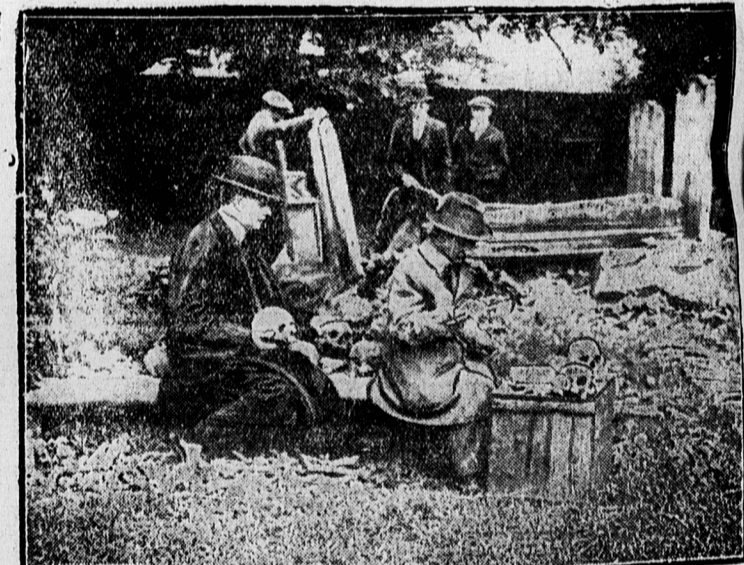
Miss Mildred Lovett was the winner of a beauty contest, with athletic accomplishments considered, in Philadelphia recently.



Among the poor unfortunates to whom radio has brought great happiness is this little boy, who sits all day with one foot trussed up and held with pulleys.



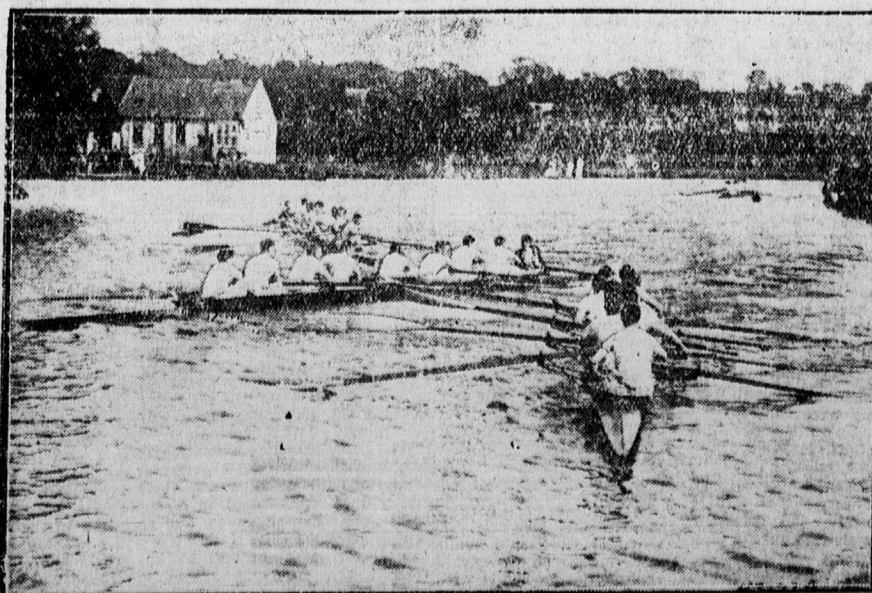
One of the very newest for milady's hairdress shows the exclusive use of pearls, which threaten to become popular for evening wear.
