Publicity For The Maritimes In Ontario

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 6.—Through generous private subscriptions from Ontario friends of the Maritime Provinces Trade Commission, a fund has been created for a series of six specially prepared addresses on the Maritime Provinces and national policies affecting their development which are to be broadcasted throughout Ontario under the auspices of the Commission. Mr. E. M. Saunders, chairman, announced today to the Toronto executive.

While funds are definitely subscribed for the broadcast in Ontario, it is expected arrangements can be made for an eastern Canadian hook-up to include Quebec and Maritime stations. Outstanding leaders in Maritime industrial and political affairs are being asked to prepare some of these addresses, and the Commission has arranged for the radio broadcast.

The constructive publicity and educational value to be derived from the series is indicated by the following tentative titles: "Economic links of nationhood—increasing inter-provincial trade a common necessity for Canadian prosperity;" "The development of Maritime ports as an essential factor in the extension of Canada's empire and international trade;" "The formation of a nation—in the front page of Canadian history;" "Industrial and Investment opportunities;" "The basic industries of Maritime Canada."

This program which the Commission considers an important part of its campaign on behalf of Maritime industries and tourist attractions has been made possible by the efforts of Mr. Saunders and the co-operation of a group of enthusiastic Maritimers now living in Toronto.

Horse Show Dates Allotted

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 6.—Dates for 65 horse shows were approved today at the annual meeting of the association of American Horse Shows. The Royal Agricultural Winter Fair at Toronto was allotted for February 16-24. The Atlantic City Horse Show Association, elected to membership in the national organization last year, will start the thoroughbred on their way around the tanbark circuit with a three-day exhibition starting April 14. The National Horse Show held annually in Madison Square Garden, again was allotted the week of Nov. 9 to 15, while the Boston show will be held Oct. 25-29. A report of the directors of the National Association showed that 108 shows were held in 1931, an increase of 11 over the previous year.

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., Jan. 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—Campbellton Tigers took revenge at the expense of Charlottetown Abegweits here tonight by defeating them three to one in a thrilling senior Northern League hockey match. It was the Tigers second win of the season, following a long series of defeats.

GOVERNOR-GENERAL SHOWS THE WAY SAVE EXPENSE UNTIL BRIGHTER DAY OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—In keeping with the times, an era of strict economy is being exercised at Government House. The Earl of Bessborough has voluntarily given up the use of a special train, even where the schedules are at times somewhat inconvenient. In lieu of a special train the Government House car has been attached to regular trains, and by means of a connection at Smith's Falls, several trips have been made to Montreal and return by using the Toronto-Montreal service part of the way and the Toronto-Ottawa for the remainder of the journey.

All social functions are being kept to a minimum in number and expense. Except for the state dinner and one or two similar affairs which can hardly be discontinued, the season will be a quiet one, and the estimates for Government House will this year be the lightest in years.

The Bessboroughs are setting the example in return to a period of more modest expenditure and greater freedom from formality. The New Year's levee, held in Confederation Hall instead of the stately Senate chamber, with dress optional, is an indication of the new spirit.

With distress and unemployment still rampant throughout the country, the authorities feel that extravagant social affairs are not justified, and the current era of economy is framed on that idea.

Hindenburg Makes Disarmament Plea

BERLIN, Jan. 6.—(AP)—President Paul von Hindenburg, replying yesterday to the new year's greetings of the diplomatic corps, renewed his plea for disarmament and international cooperation in the solution of the world's economic troubles.

"One nation cannot overcome the world crisis," he said. "All governments should cooperate in devising a solution which will permit recovery of world trade. It must not happen that hopes for disarmament should be dashed once more. If confidence is to be restored there must be equality before the law for all nations."
