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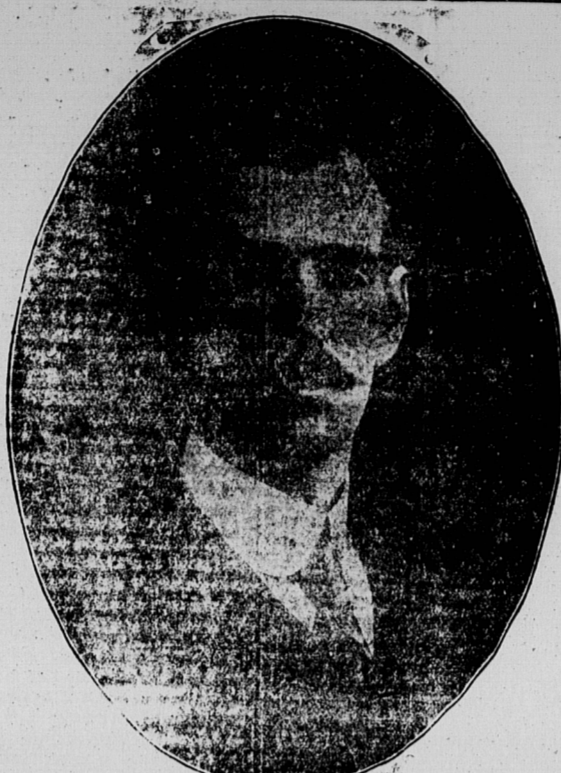

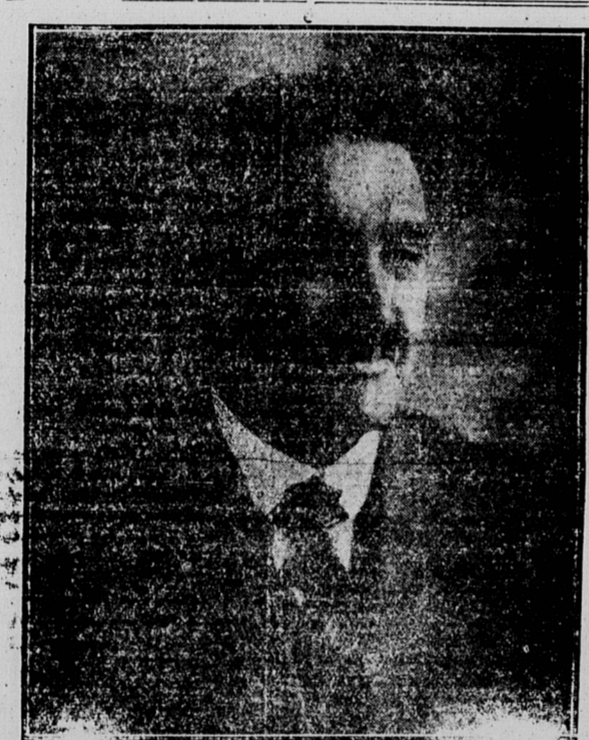

These were sent by two airplanes which landed on a field near Falconwood and which made the trip from the railway city in twenty minutes. Five minutes after the supplies were landed the steamer left.

THE NEW FORUM—Through a typographical error the price paid by the Charlottetown Forum Co. for the Ward property was given yesterday as \$5,000 instead of \$10,000. The Company has sold houses for renovation, thereby reducing the price paid for the whole property to approximately \$10,500—a very favorable figure for such an excellent site. The contract for the building is let to Messrs. MacDougall and MacAulay for about \$40,000. They began work yesterday.

PLANES ANSWER RUSH CALL—Two chartered biplanes circled the city yesterday afternoon, carrying supplies for the light houses on the Straits of Belle Isle. The planes landed near Falconwood, and discharged their cargoes, which were at once loaded on the C. G. S. Aranmore. The steamer left port immediately after for Belle Isle. The planes left Moncton at 1 p. m. Standard Time and arrived in the city at 12.30 Daylight Saving Time.

MOTOR ACCIDENT—What might have proved a serious or possibly fatal accident occurred about 8 o'clock Monday evening when a car went over the approach to the Hillsboro Bridge on the Southport side without injury to the occupants save a shaking up. A young lady with several children was driving over the bridge when in some manner the car swerved to the left going over the side of the approach and landing on the

large stones below. The tide was in at the time but the bulky stones kept the car from going into the water. The occupants made a hurried exit and in a short time a crowd gathered and a rope was fastened to the rear axle of the car which was not at that time damaged. After a strenuous pull the car was brought just to the edge of security when on the last pull the knot slipped and the car plunged back into its former position badly smashing the body and glass in windshield and doors. It was finally taken up and towed to a garage.
