**Would Boost U.K. Lumber Prices**

(C.P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire)  
HULL, England, Dec. 9.—Hull timber importers received word tonight from Sweden of an important international agreement reached by European timber-growing countries designed to regulate in more orderly manner exports to Great Britain.

A conference took place within the past fortnight at Copenhagen, Sweden, Russia, Poland, Finland and Austria were represented.

Reports here said an agreement was signed to limit the total quantity of timber shipped to the United Kingdom, based on market demands. The object of the agreement was to raise the price level.

Timber importers in Hull said the new agreement was influenced by the unremunerative state of the market in Hull. For some time shipments have been in excess of the market requirements and as a result prices have fallen to a very low level.

No details have been received regarding the projected reduction in supplies. Importers here, however, said if it created stability in the market it would be welcomed.

**U.S. to Strengthen Its Air Craft**

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—A five-year aircraft buying program intended to nearly quadruple the United States army's fighting plane strength by 1941, was "urgently" recommended today by Secretary of War Dern.

He proposed the annual purchase of 800 planes of all types in the next five years, his annual report holding the present air force "far short of its reasonable requirements."

This program, he estimated, would equip the army with 3,000 combat planes by the end of the five-year period. It now has 1,196 planes, of which only 838 are combat. The remainder are observation, training and transport ships. There are 314 more under construction.

"It is a pity," said the report of the nation's defence generally, "that we should have become so oblivious to the bitter lessons of the world war as to allow our defence to dwindle until, if another war should be forced upon us, we should as usual, be unprepared for effective action."

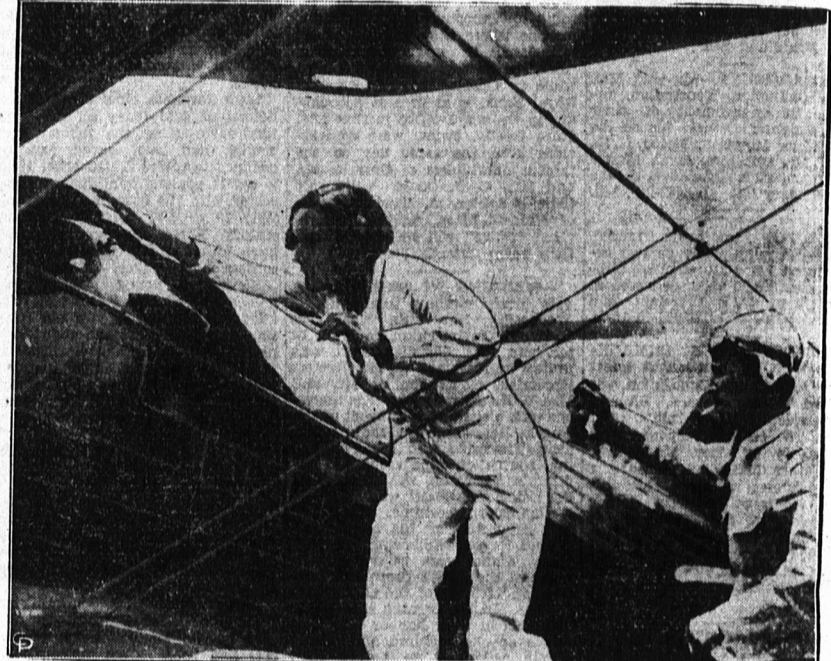

**MUNICIPALITIES ASK SCHOOL AID**

REGINA, Dec. 9.—(CP)—A plan to place school teachers on the civil service pay roll until financially-harrassed municipalities are again able to assume salary responsibilities has been submitted to the Saskatchewan government.

The request, which came from the Lone Tree municipality in the dried-out areas of southern Saskatchewan, has received the support of other municipalities and teachers' organizations. Present circumstances, it is pointed out, have brought extreme hardship to teachers and ratepayers.

Many municipalities in areas which have produced no crop for several years, it is recorded in a resolution accompanying the proposal, are unable to borrow money for urgent needs. Nonpayment of tax arrears has made it impossible to support schools and pay teachers back salary amounting to \$800,000.

A number of teachers, it is stated are working for their board alone; others are volunteering their services without pay while working at odd jobs to support themselves. Notes for thousands of dollars are outstanding and teachers unable to collect on them.

The resolution proposes all teachers be placed on a civil service payroll and returned to their respective municipalities when conditions once again become normal.
