000 men providing a livelihood for a million people in their country, as against their providing a living for twelve hundred men of 4,800 population for us at Britain's expense.

The proportion of good will exchange stands thus: Twelve hundred Canadians employed in a living in Canada for 4,800 people; Canada providing raw material for the employment in the United States of 250,000 men supporting a population of one million people.

Why does the United States attract so much immigration? Largely because they import so much raw material from Canada to work on at big wages over there.

Canadians think of it, and think of it again, until your feelings boil your courage to the point of insisting on Canada remedying this condition at once.

In addition to the above one-sided exchange of courtesies, just think how the Chicago diversion of water from the Great Lakes, without ever asking Canada's permission, let alone waiting for her consent; or the United States agreeing to a quid-pro-quo, which would mean an additional development on the Canadian side of 500,000 horse power at Cornwall or any other location Canada decided upon.

Now what would that mean in Canada?

In some kinds of electrical power application, one horse power will keep ten men employed, but suppose the average would be two. Chicago's irregular diversion would and probably does provide sufficient power to employ one million men and support an additional population of 4,000,000 people over there. I would not propose that we should immediately march over and at the top the diversion, but beginning tomorrow moving to develop 250,000 horse power at Cornwall, and further development at other places where most urgently required. It is a means of getting our quid-pro-quo, which we nationally need so badly to prevent ourselves from the serious affects of a power famine now facing us.

If the international practice is to help yourself to what you want without permission, why not begin in Canada at once. As soon as we develop a quid-pro-quo, a fair adjustment would soon be reached. In the face of this disrespect for international courteous conduct by Chicago, she seems to hold up her head in an imaginary respectfulness, seemingly respecting on the bluff "WHAT WE WANT WE TAKE," irrespective of the opinions of or results to others.

After months of investigation and consideration the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada ordered the rates on grain from Armstrong to Quebec to be reduced from 34 1/2¢ per cwt. to 18.34¢ per cwt. which is equivalent to a reduction from the West to the Pacific Coast.

Now Alberta to Ontario is about equally distant—or less to many parts, and coal can be loaded and unloaded just as quickly as grain, is less perishable, less valuable, and requires less shelter from the weather.

Why not apply this same rate to coal, and save from 50 to 100 million dollars annually to Canada, instead of paying it to the United States as at present? Or make an experimental rate of say \$4.00, or \$5.00 at most, in train load lots. We would also thereby avoid future coal famines.

I am still willing to put up a forfeit of \$5,000.00 that the actual cost of transport operations will be less than that amount, if permitted to direct the traffic.

Recent improved machinery, I understand, enables Steel Concerns to produce one third more material, make a third more profit, and employ a third less men.

The same thing, I believe, applies to the Knitting Industries, and many other lines of production. The unnecessary men from these institutions must find employment in other lines or leave the country.

The Liberal Party at present administering Canadian affairs, have adopted small experiments along some of the above lines, but altogether too slowly for Canada to

reap the enormous benefits she should be enjoying.

Some members of the Conservative Party are talking favorably of these ideas, but as yet have not adopted it as a very large plank in their Platform, and unless they adopt a truly Canadian policy at the approaching Party Convention, their ambitions for victory cannot be realized.

The Labor Party seem to approve all its principles, but lack the courage so far, to pronounce definitely in favor of it, and therefore just drift.

The Party that earnestly takes up this truly Canadian Policy will surely win the next Federal Election. Otherwise the present coalition unless something unforeseen happens in the meantime.

The Labor party is the most numerous of any party in Canada today, but has never had the courage to organize and enter a campaign upon an all Canadian Policy, and consequently has never won. Now is their opportunity, will they grasp it?

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22.—Canadian egg markets show no change today, with a firm demand existing for the higher grades.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 22.—This market is unchanged, extras are firm while the demand for firsts and seconds is easy. Dealers are paying country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, extras 46 1/2¢.

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Sept. 22.—A sale of eggs delivered, extras 46 1/2¢. A sale from Western Ontario at extras 48¢, firsts 45¢, seconds 38¢, cases to be returned.

EDMONTON, —The egg market here is steady with receipts very light. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 35-40¢, firsts 32-37¢, seconds 27-32¢. Poultry market is quiet and steady with dealers paying for live springs 16¢ per pound, live fowl 13¢ per lb.

SAINT JOHN.—The egg market here is unchanged with dealers quoting country shippers extras 45¢.

The Development of Empire Trade

Q. What is the development of Empire Trade?

A. As the first country to make preferential tariff arrangements with the Mother Country, Canada takes a foremost place in building up closer Imperial Trade relations with a creditable record. The United Kingdom has grown from \$69,153,915 in 1906 to \$133,938,192 for the fiscal year ending with March last. During the same period imports from all Empire countries have grown from \$83,789,434 to \$213,393,444. Exports to the United Kingdom amounted to \$127,456,485 in 1906, and to \$252,933,105 last year, while total exports to all parts of the Empire expanded from \$136,421,222 to \$540,441,011.

Cat Is Saved By Operation

(British United Press.) LONDON, Sept. 21.—A remarkable operation has been performed on a cat belonging to the Rev. Everard Haynes, in Kent.

The animal became ill and it was suspected of having swallowed a missing fish-hook of medium size, as its weakness for picking up buttons, coins, nails and pins was well known.

It was "admitted" to a nursing home at Sandgate, where X-ray photography showed the fish-hook near the heart. The patient was put under an anaesthetic, and F. C. Gilliard, a Folkestone veterinary surgeon, removed the hook, together with seven inches of catgut, by passing instruments up the food tube, distending the object and drawing it out through an opening made in the stomach wall.

The cat is now making excellent progress.

To clean an aluminum coffee percolator, slice a lemon and put the pieces in the percolator with plenty of cold water. Let it come to a boil and keep boiling until the surface of the percolator can be cleaned with a cloth and made to look like new.

To brighten pewter, soak the pieces for a day or two in one quart of water to which a piece of potato the size of a hickory nut has been added. Take from water, rub carefully with a cork dipped in oil, then polish with a chamomile skin and whiting. When pewter has once been cleaned it may be kept bright by washing with hot water and soap.

CANADA'S NECESSITY AND OPPORTUNITY

Sir—Now that we have generously celebrated the Diamond Jubilee of Canada's Confederation to the full, and rejoiced over her glorious past, should we not immodestly bend our energies to accomplish much greater things during the next sixty years? How can this best be done?

My belief is that we should do the most possible for Canada with Canada's raw materials, natural products, and general resources, with which kind Providence has blessed us to a greater extent than any other country in the world.

If the 1,500,000 cords of raw Canadian pulp-wood that was manufactured in the United States last year by United States workmen, at an expenditure of \$100,000,000 thereon, had been manufactured in finished paper products in Canada, it would have employed 50,000 additional workmen eight hours per day for five days per week at \$1.00 per hour for 50 weeks, equaling \$2,000 per year per man. His family will average perhaps four persons; 200,000 additional people immediately provided a comfortable living in Canada.

If the \$7,000,000 worth of raw Canada asbestos that was manufactured in the United States last year after an expenditure of \$70,000,000, had been manufactured in Canada into finished products, it would have employed 35,000 additional people with their families, making an additional population of 140,000 people.

If our Canadian nickel exports that were manufactured into finished products in the United States last year had been manufactured in Canada, it would employ 50,000 additional workmen providing for another 200,000 population in Canada.

Our copper and other minerals, our saw logs, raw lumber and many other exports combined, would have employed over 250,000 more people making at once a livelihood in Canada for an additional million population, and as our conversions were made more intensive, we would provide for another million, and still another million, and so on.

A million additional people here would immediately increase our home consumption of agricultural, horticultural and manufactured articles, and everything else we use by at least 10 per cent, and considering that the new workmen would largely be non-producers of food stuffs, it would increase our home market by 20% to 25%.

See what this would mean to producers of agricultural, horticultural products, poultry, meats, and all kinds of food stuff. In proportion to our producers we would then have the best and largest proportionate home market of any country in the world.

Make Canada a country in which every person can do well and prosper, and millions of the best people will come here. We have the raw materials to do it with, why not act at once? We have plenty of coal, and transportation facilities to distribute it. Why not use it and be self-reliant in this as well as most other respects?

Instead of formulating immigration policies providing for loans to farmers, etc., after they have served an apprenticeship of some years and waited for it, a stroke of the pen would provide for a million new consumers earning \$2,000 per family inside of a year, and that additional demand for their livelihood would provide for an additional hundred thousand farming population at once, which would immediately attract the best farmers in the British Commonwealth.

True we asked for and accepted a slight favor from the United States the other day, in their increasing our quota of workers there by twelve hundred. But the same stroke of their pen reduced Britain's quota by the same twelve hundred. Should we not be ashamed of ourselves to accept such a favor at Britain's expense? And in fact should we not be ashamed of asking such a favor in return for our permitting our raw material to go over there to increase their employment by 250,
