The report of the Council recommended increasing the number of horses on guns from four to six, and increased allowances to the men. The change, which is accommodating alike to officials and customers, consists of the removal of the office from the old site up one flight to the rear of the hat department to the ground floor just behind and to the rear of the hat and cap department where the shoe store was at one time located.
