He could not say when his firm would be able to handle small fruits such as raspberries and strawberries and gooseberries but indicated that a future market in those commodities was a distinct possibility.

Russell Champion Re-elected Mayor Of Kensington

Mr. Russell Champion was re-elected mayor of Kensington for another one-year term by acclamation yesterday as were also two members of the Council. Waldin H. Darrach and Lorna V. Dunning. Mr. Glendon Cotton was also elected by acclamation, replacing Mr. W.S. McLean who retired.

Deficit Reported

Councillor Humphrey, chairman of the Finance Committee reported a deficit for the year of \$1,008.00. Total revenue for the year amounted to \$6,768.55.

Councillor McLean, chairman of the Streets and Sidewalks Committee reported that the sum of \$4,368.27 had been spent on the streets and sidewalks this year and that they are now all in a good state of repair.

Councillor Davison of the Police Committee reported an increase in fines over the previous year.

Councillor Darrach, for the Electric Committee stated that street lighting had cost the town \$753.97 for the year.

Councillor Dunning, chairman of the committee in charge of the Fire Department reported considerable activity in his department and said that the cost of operation for the year was \$274.68.

At the conclusion of the meeting Mr. A.L. Rogers moved a motion expressing the appreciation of the citizens to the Mayor and Council for the manner in which they had carried on the work of the Town during the past year. This motion was seconded by Mr. S.R. Nauss and passed.

Mayor Champion responded to this motion on behalf of himself and the Council.—S.
