## Ambitious Plans Laid For Flight In 1933

DAYTON, O., Dec. 19.—Tentative plans for a round trip trans-Atlantic flight in 1933, for the purpose of testing new airplane equipment and devices have been announced by Lewis F. Green, of Dayton. The flight also would be in commemoration of the 30th anniversary of the flight of Orville and Wilbur Wright at Kitty Hawk, N. C.

A special plane will be constructed for the flight which will take Green and Larry D. Ruch, St. George, Staten Island, N. Y., on the 17,500 mile trip to New York, Harbor Grace, Dublin, London, Paris, Berlin, Prague, Vienna, Rome, Marseilles, Barcelona, Madrid, Rabat, Freetown, French Guiana, Natal, Brazil, Caracas, Venezuela, Havana and Miami, Fla., and thence to Dayton.

## Little Is Learned About Influenza

JACKSON, Miss., Dec. 19.—Dr. W. A. Evans, Chicago health expert, told a conference of Mississippi health workers here yesterday that medical science has "not learned a thing about influenza since 1918," year of the last widespread epidemic in Canada, the United States and other parts of the world. "And," he added, "the disease found us as helpless in 1918 as in 1890-91," when the previous extensive outbreak occurred. Dr. Evans described the outbreak as "periodical pandemics,"

## Wrong Solution Claims Lives Of Three Babies

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—A third baby died today at the New York Hospital and Cornell Medical College Association from what the medical examiner said were the effects of an injection of boric acid solution given by mistake for a saline solution.

Two infants died at the hospital Saturday supposedly from the same cause. It was believed then that the third baby who received the injection was responding successfully to treatment, but the child lived only a day longer.

John R. Howard, Jr., superintendent of the hospital, said the nurse who prepared the injection was a graduate of four years standing and that she had a good record. The nurse, whose name was not disclosed, has been relieved of duty.

Autopsies showed the infants died of a collapse of the lungs, together with acute inflammation of the stomach, bowels and kidneys.
