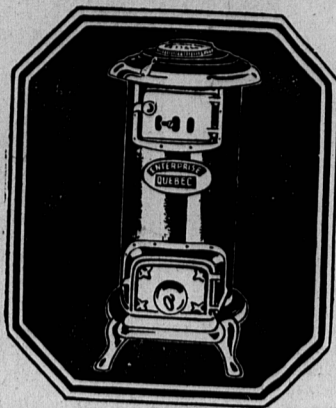

PROTECTING LOBSTER FISHERIES—Government patrol boats have been active in protecting the lobster fisheries this season. 895 traps and 5,945 fathoms of rope have been seized and 8,419 lobsters liberated by the officers. The oyster boat "Ostrea II" was placed on patrol duty on August 24th, and the "A. A. Halkett" on September 29th. We also had the services of the patrol "Arras" on the 1st, 3rd and 4th of October. In addition to these, the Department is having a speed boat come to Charlottetown, and immediately on its arrival this boat will be placed on duty in an endeavor to intercept boats that will undertake to fish in the close season areas. Any boats caught fishing illegally will be seized, the fishermen will be placed under arrest and will be brought up for trial in Charlottetown.

\$100,000 Wheat Crop Sowed Itself

HARDIN, Mont., Oct. 10.—Nature has been exceedingly kind this season to Thomas Campbell, once known as the Montana wheat king and frequently referred to as the largest wheat farmer in the world. And it has been kind, also, to the Crow Indians on whose government reservation Tom Campbell built up the mammoth farming corporation which a year ago came to a standstill at the expense of Campbell and a score of Chicago and Minneapolis bankers and grain men who had financed him.

It has all come about through the voluntary seeding last fall of some 15,000 acres of former wheat land which had been abandoned by the Campbell Corporation. The crop which came up of its own has just been marketed to the credit of the federal government, which took the corporation farm for back rent.

Of the \$100,000 realized on the volunteer crop, the government has paid Campbell \$30,000 for harvesting and marketing. The balance has been credited to the Indian reservation, after deducting commissions to the Federal Farm Board's grain sales agency, the Farmers' National Grain Corporation.

Last season, when Campbell announced he would not raise a crop, his announcement was heralded by the farm board as the answer of a big wheat farmer to their appeal for reduced wheat production. Neither he nor the government which had rented him the Indian land foresaw the conditions that produced the self-planted wheat just marketed.
