YESTERDAY evening Mr. F. G. Folsom, of the Dominion Hatchery, Bedford, arrived in the city by the Princess. He brought 50,000 young salmon which he placed in the Morell River last night. The fish were hatched in April.

YESTERDAY men were at work caulking the deck and painting the S. S. Brant. In the course of a few days the steamer will leave to supply the light houses, taking material for the construction of a dwelling house for the keeper of the East Point Light.

YESTERDAY a number of men were engaged in placing machinery to be used in the Bridge construction, on a schooner at Pictou for transfer to this port. The lot consists in part of four boilers, three air compressors and a high speed engine.

MR. M. S. Johnson was a passenger to Montague from Pictou by S. S. Electra Monday evening. Mr. Johnson purposes remaining in Montague for a time. He previously held a position on the Sydney Post and also travelled in the Maritime Provinces for a well known New York firm.

It is understood there are a number of applications for the late Captain W. H. Smith's position. There are applications from as far west as British Columbia and one from England. A retired Royal Navy Reserve officer on P. E. Island is thought to stand a good chance of the appointment.—Halifax Chronicle.
