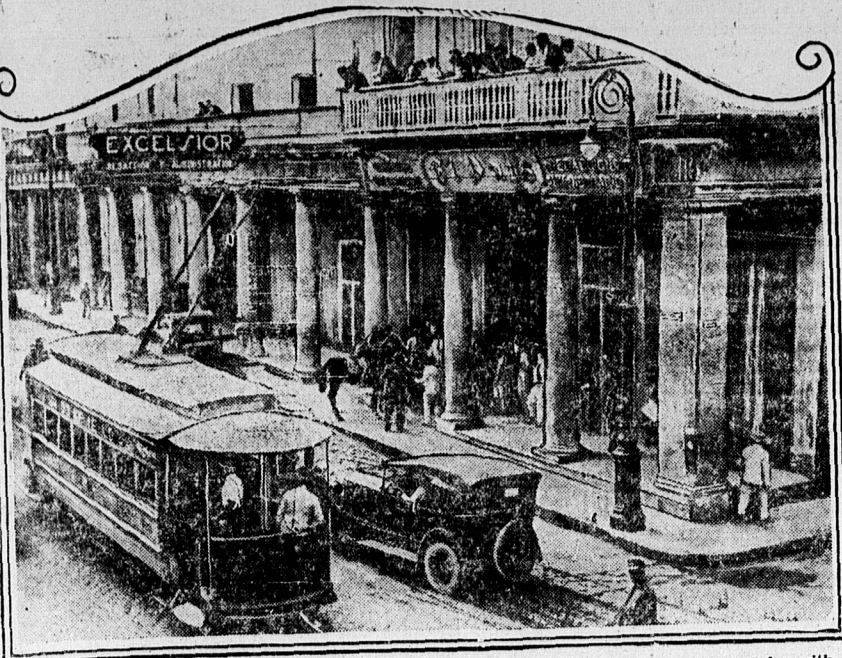

Scene Of Rioting In Havana, Cuba



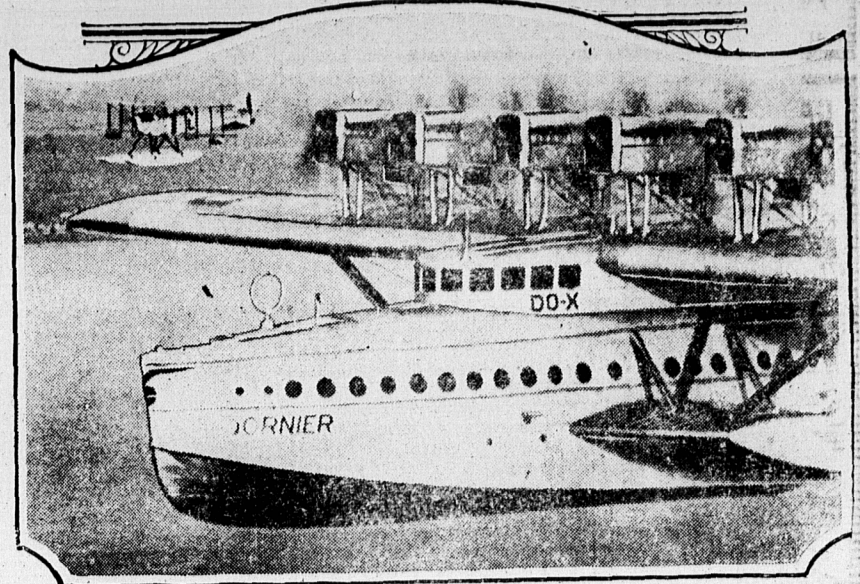

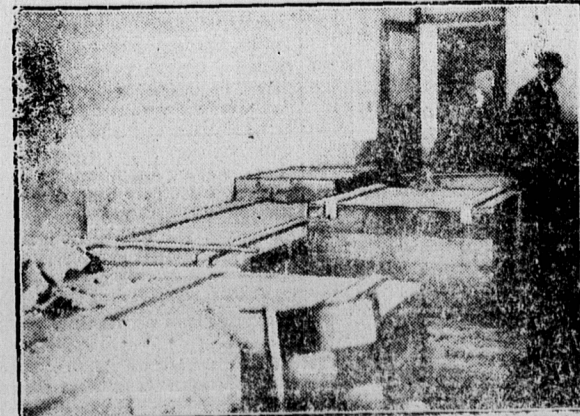
