

Suggest 10 Million For Sport Facilities In Next Three Years

OTTAWA, Jan. 9 (CP)—As Canadian sports leaders see it, there's not much wrong with amateur sports in the Dominion that a few million dollars can't fix.

The brass-hats of practically every sports-governing organization in Canada — few such bodies have money in the bank — talked about millions in a two-day conference ended Saturday. And it was the taxpayer's money they banded about.

The result included two financial recommendations:—

1. Expenditure by the Dominion Government of \$10,000,000 over a three-year period for expansion of recreation facilities across the country.

2. An additional \$300,000-a-year grant for the organization, development, coaching, materials and services for amateur athletics.

Whether amateur sport will get the recommended financial shot in the arm was not known. No comment came immediately from the government which had more than 20 "observers" at the session.

Any funds for sports would be made available through the Department of Health and Welfare but Paul Martin, the Minister, declined comment on the proposals.

Delegates talked of many other phases of sport — amateur and professional — but the monetary question was the main theme. They won't know for at least two months if the Government will help out.

J.M. McAvity of Montreal, president of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association who headed the six-man committee which framed the recommendations, said "we had reasons" for recommending the amounts.

The recommendations were passed after opposition by the two wealthiest organizations at the meeting, called by the National Council on Physical Fitness.

Clarence Campbell of Montreal, president of the National Hockey League, and George Dudley of Midland, Ont., secretary-manager of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, favored expansion of basic facilities, such as play grounds, but balked at the \$300,000 asked for the organization and development of amateur sport.

Campbell said it was "extremely dangerous" to take funds from the public treasury. Voluntary efforts of individuals in sport would "disappear" when the taxpayer's dollar is put into it, and these persons were the "life-blood of sports."

Later he said that "when the Government starts providing coaches it's just like starting what we call 'operation pyramid' and the purely voluntary workers disappear." He warned this would happen if the \$300,000 grant is made available.

Dudley said it was "inevitable" that if the Government is to pay for the administration of sports "someone with political pull will take advantage of it."

Many Disagree
Their views were echoed by Roy Ashworth of Montreal, president of the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association, but most delegates disagreed with them.

McAvity said he had seen "a dozen men give their time and generous efforts to help the O.L.C.A., but these are not enough. We are going to develop our own non-money-making organization."

A. Sidney Dawes of Montreal, president of the Canadian Olympic Association, protested opposition from the N.H.L. president and said:

"I don't think he realized how difficult it is for sports-governing bodies to carry on. This \$300,000 will be a great help."

Delegates were not bound by decisions taken, and all recommendations must first be submitted to sports-governing bodies where majority-vote rules prevail and action must be taken within two months. Dawes suggested the two-month time-limit to enable representations being made to the

Government before the budget is brought down.

The meeting almost blew up shortly after the start Friday morning when Ashworth, the firebrand of the sessions, started delegates with a motion that the 10-point agenda, prepared by the Fitness Council, be killed. He was willing to introduce a substitute but an amended motion asking adoption of the agenda with any necessary changes was carried.

Ashworth's motion was interpreted by some delegates as a test of strength of the meeting.

Two items were deleted — the touchy question dealing with definition of an amateur for Canadian sport and sponsorship of teams and leagues by commercial companies. Ashworth, who recommended both should be thrown out, said they were "contentious, as was the whole agenda."

Other recommendations included:—

1. The Fitness Council should make "strong representations to the appropriate authorities" towards obtaining reduced transportation rates for teams and individual athletes and for accredited officials of recognized sports-governing bodies traveling to and from competitions and meetings.

2. Training of school-age children should be done by "persons recruited from the active teaching profession, and that the training of these teacher-instructors be carried out by their Provincial Departments of Education in co-operation with the National Council on Physical Fitness on a reciprocal basis."

3. Formation of a Canadian sports-advisory Council.

Detroit Red Wings Regain Top Spot In National Hockey League

DETROIT, Jan. 9 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings came from behind with a goal in each of the last two periods tonight to tie Toronto 2-2 and retain sole possession of the National Hockey League leadership. A crowd of 14,791 fans saw the game.

Toronto spurred into a 2-0 lead on first period goals by Harry Watson and Bill Ezinicki but Detroit kept hammering and scored the tying goal with 6½ minutes remaining.

Toronto's lead was short-lived as Detroit's center, George Gae, for an "indefinite" period when he re-injured his knee as Bill Barliko checked him hard in the opening period.

CHICAGO, Jan. 9 (CP)—Chicago Black Hawks tonight defeated Boston Bruins 4 to 2 in a National Hockey League game before a season's record crowd of 17,386 fans.

Roy Conacher got two of Chicago's goals but the most spectacular shot of the evening came at 19:13 of the third period. At that time, the Hawks held a 3-2 edge and Boston pulled goalie Frank Brimsek out of there in order to put six forwards on the ice.

A scramble from a faceoff near the Chicago nets, Doug Bentley captured the puck and passed to Gus Bodnar, who, standing at his own blue line, fired a 125-foot shot into the unprotected Boston goal. The contest was remarkably clean with only one penalty called.

The Hawks had gone four games without a victory up to tonight. Three of those were defeats and one, at Toronto last night, a tie.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—Montreal Canadiens and New York Rangers battled to a 1-1 tie tonight in a ragged, penalty-filled National Hockey League game before 15,925 fans in Madison Square Garden.

The deadlock, marked by frequent periods of listless play, left the two teams in the same place in the standings in which they had started the game—Montreal in a fourth place tie with Toronto and New York at the bottom of the pile.

A total of 14 penalties were handed out including the two 10-minute misconducts for fighting. Six went to the Canadiens and eight to the Rangers.

Bill Moe and Murph Chamberlain drew the misconducts when they fought in the penalty box after drawing high-sticking penalties. During the melee, referee Frank (King) Clancy was hit in the eye with a coin thrown by a fan.

Former Boxer Up On Murder Charge

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 6—Gus Dorazio, former heavyweight boxer who said he was tired of being taunted and called "punch drunk," Saturday was accused of beating a local brewerly employee to death.

Dorazio, a leading challenger for the heavyweight crown eight years ago, was arraigned and held without bail in connection with the slaying of Albert Blomeyer, 33.

Dorazio fought champion Joe Louis in Philadelphia, Feb. 17, 1941, and was knocked out in the second round. He later came back to whip Joe Baksi, a current title contender.

Blomeyer has seen little action in the ring since serving a year in 1946 in Federal prison as a Second World War draft-dodger.

Police said the victim suffered fatal injuries in a fight in the engineering department of the C. Schmidt and Sons, Incorporated, Brewery.
