PETITION TO END SLAVERY IN AMAZON REGION

LONDON, July 25—A petition signed by Most Rev. John Baptist Crozier, archbishop of Armagh and primate of All Ireland (Church of Ireland); Sir Rev. James Jeakes, prebendary of Harleston, in St. Paul's cathedral; Sir John Jardine, M. P., and Lady Jardine; Noel Buxton, M. P., for Norfolk; Rev. J. H. Harris, of the anti-slavery society, and Archdeacon Potter, in regard to the Peruvian outrages, has been forwarded to Premier Asquith. It says among other things: "We desire to point out that it is the duty of Great Britain, acting with the United States to take steps to put an end to the slavery system in the Amazon district."

CANADIAN MINISTERS IN PARIS

PARIS, July 25—The Canadian postmaster-general, Hon. Philip Pelletier, arrived here this evening. He was met by a representative of Premier Poincare, the Canadian commissioner to France; Dr. Philippe Roy and the secretary of the Franco-American committee, Gabriel Louis Jarry. The principal object of Mr. Pelletier's visit is to arrange, if possible, with M. Chaumet, under secretary of posts and telegraphs, for a reduction in cable rates and for the introduction of a two cent postage between Canada and France. The postmaster-general will be joined on Saturday by the Canadian premier, Right Hon. Robert L. Borden; the Canadian minister of justice, Hon. G. J. Doherty; the minister of marine and fisheries, Hon. J. Douglas Hasen and Hon. A. E. Kemp, minister without portfolio.

YOUNG BABY SCALDED IN POT OF SOUP

FRANK, Alta., July 25—The two-year-old baby of John and Mrs. McDonnell of the Union hotel of this city met death in a singular manner Wednesday. The baby was playing on the floor of the kitchen in the hotel while the pot of soup was placed on the floor for a moment. The baby fell into the soup and was so terribly scalded that it died soon afterward.

TWO KILLED BY CAVE IN IN QUEBEC

QUEBEC, July 25—As a result of a cave-in, which occurred yesterday afternoon, while a number of men were digging the banks of the canal at Kenogami, Que., two men were killed and five Italians and Poles were injured, two mortally. Five other men who were caught in the slip, escaped without injury. Three more are supposed to be still underneath the soil which fell. One hundred men are now working to clear the channel and remove the other victims.

DEMOCRATE MURDERED

JONESVILLE, Va., July 25—The killing of Dr. James W. Walden, a prominent democrat, last night by Perry Wallin, a republican leader, has fanned a smouldering political feud in the Blackwater district to a threatened outbreak. All through the mountain district the clans are lining up.

The coming trial of 200 mountaineers, charged with vote selling, is causing the local authorities to make preparation for the protection of the court and the jury. They fear an outbreak paralleling the tragedy at Hillsville last March, when, with the exception of one man, the entire human fabric of the court was wiped out.

BREADNOTS MORE FEARED THAN DREADNAUGHTS

Cannot Recover the Bibles of Miners Within a Month

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, July 26—A special cable from London says: "German Dreadnaughts are less to be feared than British Bread-Notes" shouted leader Ben Tillett to a throng of striking dock workers today. He execrated the government spending money on battleships when British workmen and their families are starving.

2,000 G. T. P. LABORERS ON STRIKE

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, July 26—The Senate by a vote of 37 to 18 passed the house excise tax bill which would extend the corporation tax law to individuals and co-partnerships on an income in excess of \$5,000.

\$30,000,000 TO BE CANADAS CONTRIBUTION

LONDON, July 26—The Daily Mail's parliamentary correspondent declares that it is an open secret that the Canadian Premier, Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and his colleagues are prepared to recommend the contribution of \$30,000,000 to build three dreadnaughts, but that nothing can be announced until the ministers' return to Canada.

GRAIN GROWERS WILL TAKE OVER ELEVATORS

(Canadian Press.) WINNIPEG, July 26—The Grain Growers Company will take over the operation of the government elevators on September 1st.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT NEARLY TURNED OUT OF OFFICE

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, July 26—The British Government was nearly turned out of office by a snap division this afternoon. In presence of the usual thin Friday attendance Chancellor Lloyd George moved that Monday be devoted to the discussion of supplementary appropriations. The opposition forced a division. By dint of a hurried search in the lobbies of the house the government whip just managed to save the situation by a majority of only three.

STRIKE ON I. W. W.

VANCOUVER, July 25—Two thousand members of the I. W. W. have gone on strike on the Grand Trunk Lake, a distance of one hundred and eighty miles. Burns Lake is a short distance northwest of Fort George. The men quit work last night. For weeks there has been talk of a strike in the north, but as was the case with the Canadian Northern strike, no demands have been made on construction contractors for higher wages or changed conditions.

MURDERER WAS EXECUTED AT McLEOD

For Killing Husband Of Woman With Whom He Was Infatuated

(Canadian Press.) MACLEOD, July 26—Samuel Willinski was executed at the Royal North West Mounted Police barracks here at 7.36 o'clock this morning for the murder of George Lankatoo, a fellow miner at Frank, Alta., on February 6th last.

Willinski was infatuated with Lankatoo's wife and he put the husband out of the way by shooting him in the wash house of a coal mine in which both worked.

Willinski went on to the scaffold without a quiver.

There were only the sheriff, two priests and the guards and superintendent Primrose of the Mounted Police present.

CRIPPLED ALIEN MURDERS INSPECTOR

WINDSOR, Ont., July 25—H. G. Herbert, of Ottawa, travelling immigration inspector for the Dominion government, was shot and instantly killed this afternoon by a crippled alien, to whom he had refused admittance to Canada.

William Ferguson, a Scotchman, was the murderer. He shot Herbert when the latter was crossing the river to Detroit, firing four bullets. Every shot lodged in the inspector's head, causing immediate death.

The shooting occurred on the ferry boat Excelsior shortly after the boat had pulled away from the Canadian shore. The murderer was arrested in Detroit and held by the police. He will be extradited if it is shown the crime was committed while the ferry boat was in Canadian waters. If the killing was done in American waters Ferguson will face a penalty of life imprisonment for the murder of a citizen of the State of Michigan, against a death sentence if he is tried in Canada.

HARRY K THAW MUST REMAIN IN ASYLUM

(Canadian Press.) WHITEPLAINS, July 26—Harry K Thaw must remain in the asylum. Application for his freedom was denied today on the ground that he would be dangerous to public safety.

(Canadian Press.) This is the third attempt made by Harry K. Thaw to gain his liberty from Mattewan Asylum for the criminal insane on a writ of habeas corpus.

The sole question tried before Justice Keogh without a jury was whether Thaw is now sane.

During the present trial which began June 17 and was much briefer than previous habeas corpus proceedings, Mrs. Evelyn Thaw took the witness stand and Thaw himself was called to testify to the authenticity of several letters written by him.

Several noted alienists were called in the case.

(Canadian Press.) In announcing his decision Justice Keogh said: "Having listened to all the testimony I am of the opinion that Harry K. Thaw is still insane and that his discharge would be dangerous to public peace and safety."

The writ of Habeas Corpus upon which Thaw obtained temporary release from Mattewan State Asylum was dismissed and the court orders Thaw be returned to custody of Sup't of Institution.

PENNSYLVANIA FLOODS CLAIMED SIXTY LIVES

PITTSBURG, July 25—Over sixty lives were claimed Wednesday by floods and cloud bursts in southwest Pennsylvania and West Virginia, and hundreds of homes and business houses destroyed. Uniontown leads the list of known dead, with fifteen.

At Wheeling, W. Va., three were drowned, at Lamont, Pa., four drowned, at Ellwood, Pa., three drowned and 36 lives are reported to have been lost in other towns of the two states. Uniontown, Lemont, Mount Braddock, Connelsville and Dunbar, Pa., were inundated. In turtle Creek valley, the damage is enormous and scores of families are homeless in the upper Coughinghney Valley. Railroad traffic thru a great territory is demoralized, especially so at Uniontown where the tracks of two railways were torn from their foundations. Several towns are without railroads, mail, telephone and telegraph connections. From West Virginia cities, no reports can be obtained because telegraph wires are down. It will be several weeks before the complete loss of life is known. Work of clearing up the wreckage was begun today.

WHINE MEN HANGED FOR NEGRO MURDER

(Canadian Press.) NASHVILLE, July 26—Two white men, George Shelton and John Bailey, were hanged today for the murder of Ben Pettigrew, an old negro and his two children.

COMMITTED ON SERIOUS CHARGE BAIL \$10,000

OXFORD, July 26—Helen Griggs was committed by the magistrate for trial at the coming assizes on the charge of attempting to enter the Mineham House with the intention of committing arson. She was released on bail of \$10,000.

CERTIFICATES OF MASTERS AND MATES

OTTAWA, July 25—Formal notice is being issued, giving effect to the act passed last session for the employment of certificated masters and mates on ships of five tons and over, being made. The act will not apply to purely pleasure yachts, barges, fishing boats or to sailing ships engaged in the coastwise trade of not more than 100 tons, propelled by auxiliary power other than steam, and employed partly in fishing and partly in the carriage of freight.

WEDDING PARTY BLOWN TO PIECES

MILAN, July 25—An appalling tragedy marred a pretty Neapolitan wedding, and threw several families into mourning.

Signor Meninno, a rich country squire, living at Melito Valle Pontio, near Avellino, started out for the parish church for the purpose of marrying off his only daughter, a pretty maid of nineteen years.

Instead of rice, Meninno, in pursuance of an old custom prevalent in the Neapolitan provinces, had filled his pockets with fireworks, and carried in his hands three big handkerchiefs full of bombs, which he intended to explode at the church door on the exit of the bridal party.

While he was at the head of the merry procession of boys and girls, decked out for the occasion in all kinds of fantastic costumes, the bombs suddenly exploded with terrific force. Meninno himself was blown to pieces, the bridegroom and many others who had been hidden to the wedding feast were flung to the ground and fearfully mangled, and the adjacent dwellings were shaken to their foundations as by an earthquake.

SEVERAL NOTICE RE THE PANAMA CANAL. MELBOURNE, Australia, July 25—The senate of the Commonwealth of Australia today unanimously passed the resolution adopted by the house to the effect that a bonus or rebate of canal dues to American shipping using the Panama canal, would be detrimental to the interests of Australia.

PENNSYLVANIA IS RECOVERING FROM FLOODS

(Canadian Press.) PITTSBURG, July 26—Western Pennsylvania is recovering slowly from the effects of Wednesday's flood which struck the hardest blow in the coke region.

It will be more than a month before any effective effort can be made to reach the bodies of the fifteen men drowned in Superior mine No. 2 at Evans, Station, near Uniontown, for it will take that time to pump the mine dry, according to estimate of foreman Buttermore this morning.

STEAMER SUNK AT MOORINGS MAN DROWNED

(Canadian Press.) S. S. MARIE, July 6—THE Steamer John Haggart, owned by the T. K. Simms of Little Current, sank at its moorings at New Ontario Dock in fifteen feet of water at 3.30 this morning.

The John Haggart came up last night from Manitoulin and was leaking badly the pumps being worked throughout the trip.

At 3 o'clock this morning she started to settle and went down. She had a cargo of hay and lumber. It is believed that one man was drowned as he was last seen at the dock in an intoxicated condition shortly before the boat sank.

OUTRAG AND MURDER

(Canadian Press.) CARMEL, July 26—Naomi Mitchell, aged 14, was outraged and murdered yesterday. A degenerate farm hand is being sought by the police.

EMPEROR'S CONDITION

TOKIO, Japan, July 25—In a bulletin issued at half-past twelve this afternoon by the physicians in attendance on Mutsuhito, Emperor of Japan, it was announced.

As a result of an examination of his majesty at ten o'clock this morning, his temperature was found to be 98.7 degrees and his pulse 105 to 110. He showed continual restlessness and his fatigue is increasing."

Great fear is experienced in many quarters that the emperor is steadily sinking. At eight o'clock this evening a further official bulletin said: "The emperor's condition is unchanged, except that his pulse has been reduced to 100."

PAINFUL ACCIDENT IN LAUNDRY. ST. JOHN, July 26—A very painful accident occurred this afternoon in the Globe Steam Laundry, in which Mrs. Gray who is an employee had the misfortune to have her right hand badly torn, crushed and burned, by being caught in the mangle. She was taken to Dr. Purdy's office, and the woman's pain relieved as much as possible. It is possible that Mrs. Gray will lose some of her fingers, but Dr. Purdy states that the hand will be saved.

GIRL FATALLY BURNED

BOSTON, Mass., July 26—While lighting a lamp in her home, shortly before 8 o'clock Wednesday night, Florence Donovan, 14, was so badly burned about the body, when the sleeves of her dress caught fire, that she is in a critical condition at the Somerville Hospital. Surgeons at the hospital stated, that she would not live through Wednesday night.
