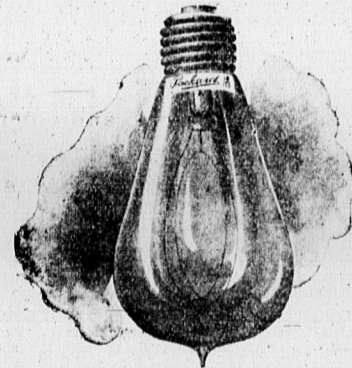

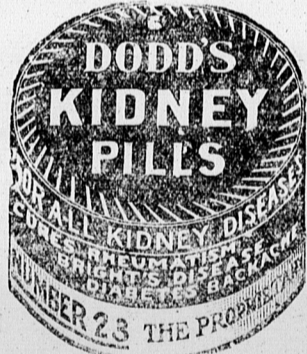

ESCAPE OF WILD BEAR TERRIFIES PITTSBURG.

PITTSBURG, Oct 31.—The ferocious bear which escaped from a pen at the Pittsburg Country Club is still terrorizing the fashionable neighborhood bordering on the club proper.

Bear tracks are numerous about the houses, and women are terrified. They are keeping children indoors and will not venture out without escort. A hunting party was organized and started after the bear at 4 o'clock this morning. Before the hunt stopped for the day the party had been augmented by scores of spectators, reporters and staff photographers.

The animal was tracked through dense woods, but has eluded every effort at capture. Two of the dogs which were taken along met the bear on a hillside. They attacked it, and one of them was badly torn by the creature's claws, while the other had its ear ripped off.

The search will be taken up tomorrow.

STRIKERS INDICTED FOR UNLAWFUL ASSEMBLY

SYDNEY, Oct 31.—The Supreme Court resumed its session yesterday, the attendance of the barristers and spectators was not nearly as large as that of the first days of the week, this being easily accounted for the fact that the Nash murder trial had been concluded, in which case great interest had been manifested by the public generally. The proceedings before the Court were of an interesting nature. After the Court opened the counsel in the Nash case referred to reports in the newspapers as being unfair; the comments of the local papers, His Lordship said that there must not be any comment by any public journal on matters before the Court.

The case of the King vs Abraham Rubin on the charge of perjury, was heard, and the Jury brought in a verdict of acquittal in this case this afternoon. The Grand Jury have submitted true bills in the cases of the King vs Leon, John Butts, John J. McNeil, D. McIntyre and Win. Fowler, strikers, on the charge of unlawful assembly. These are cases which arose out of the Cliff disturbance at New Aberdeen a few weeks ago, when the strikers and police were in a clash. The first of these cases will probably be commenced tomorrow.

NUMBERS OF CHINESE ENTER.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.—A report from the Department of Trade and Commerce shows that during the past twelve months the total number of Chinese entering Canada subject to the poll tax of \$500, was 469. This is only a few more than during the preceding twelve months. The total poll tax collected \$233,500, of which Columbia gets half.

During the same period, 464 Chinese arrived at Vancouver in transit to the United States or other countries.

FATAL EXPLOSION IN A COAL MINE.

JAMESTOWN, Pa., Nov. 1.—Twelve men were killed in the Cambria Steel Company's Coal Mine, two miles from here, as the result of a dynamite explosion. All the dead are foreigners. Three men escaped by a perilous climb on life ladders through the poisonous gas and falling slate up the steep walls of the main shaft. At the time of the explosion, only fifteen workmen, all track layers, were in the mine.

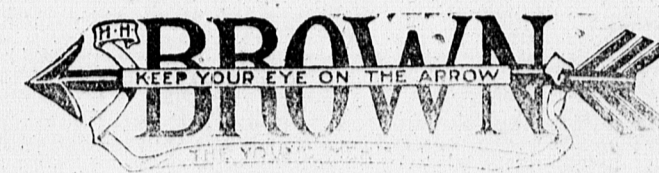

TO OUR CUSTOMERS.

As all are aware the crop has been harvested (owing to bad weather) in a very irregular way, some farmers having finished it some fully three weeks ago, while others have more or less still to dig. This in itself would make it very unwise to place vessels on the berth too early. It is a well known fact that all vegetables should be matured in cellars or outbuildings before being shipped and by our beginning to load too early, we were sure to get a portion of unripened stock, dug and shipped the same day, direct from the field, which when dumped in large quantities in vessels would heat and rot, proving not only disastrous to the shipper but also ruinous to the markets. For your further information we desire to inform you that we have ten schus now under charter and on the way here and in the course of a few days will be prepared to take care of all the potatoes you have to offer in the same satisfactory manner as in former seasons.

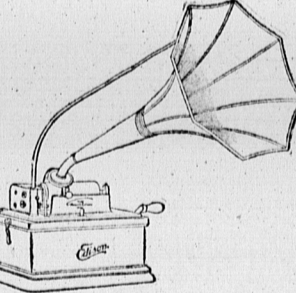
