TENDERS TO BE CALLED—Tenders for the new car ferry will be called for some time between Nov. 15 and Nov. 30, states Mr. R. H. Jenkins, M. P., who returned this week from Montreal. The tenders will be called for both in Canada and the Old Country. Details of the construction of the new steamer and terminals have already appeared in The Guardian. The tenders for the new C. N. R. hotel, Mr. Jenkins states, will be opened on Nov. 15. The new hotel will be modern in every way, the lower floor having an office, writing room, large lobby, lounge room 35 x 45, breakfast room 28 x 30, dining room 50 x 60, and kitchen 38 x 58. The main entrance will be on Kent street. The second floor will contain fourteen rooms and seven sample rooms and three extra floors will have 28 bed-rooms each, making 108 in all. All these bed-rooms will have baths and will be thoroughly up-to-date in every way. A large space is reserved on Bowal street for a garden, which will add greatly to the appearance of the grounds. It is hoped that the hotel will be in operation in time to take care of at least a portion of next season's business.

REV. J. W. MACKENZIE

The death occurred in his home in city Tuesday afternoon of Rev. J. W. Mackenzie, who was in the 76th year of his age. Mr. Mackenzie retired from the active work of the ministry four years ago after laboring for forty years in his Master's beyond.

About two months ago his health began to fail and recently he was seized with paralysis from which he is not rally.
