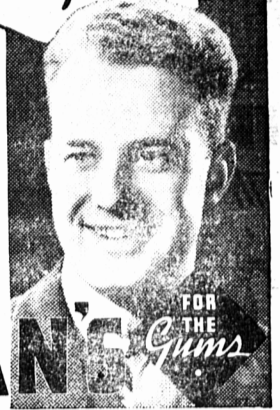

Reorganization Of P. E. Island Tennis Ass'n.

The P. E. I. Tennis Association which since its inception four years ago consisted only of two members—the Charlottetown Club and the Summerside Club—has reorganized and now includes three additional clubs—the Holy Redeemer, the Holy Name and the Maple Clubs all of Charlottetown. At a representative meeting last Tuesday evening at the office of Dr. T. E. E. Robins a new constitution was adopted and a new staff of officers elected for the ensuing year and great enthusiasm prevailed. With an enlarged membership, particularly of such active clubs as above mentioned—the Association is greatly strengthened and in a position to promote tennis in a bigger way. The Holy Redeemer Club located at Upper Queen Street possesses three fine courts and a membership of over 100. Apart from tennis this club has ground reserved for young children, containing various amusement devices and so supervised that parents need not worry about their kiddies safety—a boon to this crowded section of the City. The Holy Name Club and the Maple Leaf Clubs are located at Victoria Park across the way from the old Charlottetown Club. The former has also a membership of over 100 and have three excellent courts. The Maple Leaf Club also three courts immediately adjoining the Holy Name courts and have up to the present time upwards of 75 members. The week beginning August 13th next has been fixed as the date for the Open Provincial Championship Tournament and already a large number of entries from outside the Province is assured. Results Of Holiday Bills See Yankees Keep Lead Over The Detroit Tigers

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 4—A holiday crowd of 33,819 saw the Boston Red Sox win the first game of a doubleheader with New York Yankees 8-5 and then drop the second 10-4 at Boston. The Sox slammed the offerings of Danny MacFadden native of Nova Scotia, for 12 hits before a man was out in the fifth inning of the first game and scored seven of their eight runs at his expense. Jimmy Deshong held the Red Sox to four hits in the nightcap for his first victory of the season. Tigers Keep Pace With Yankees. Fugging the heels of the league's leading Yankees, Detroit Tigers at home divided honors with Cleveland in a doubleheader, dropping the first game 8-6 but coming back to capture the second 5-2. In the second game, Fischer started for Detroit but was lifted in the third inning after having allowed five hits and three bases on balls. Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe finished the game and got credit for the victory. Darkness forested the conclusion of the game in the eighth inning. Senators Drop Twin Bill. Washington fans—or many of them anyhow—virtually gave up hope that the Senators would repeat in the pennant race after the League Champions were handed a crushing double defeat by Philadelphia, 10-9 and 6-3. The first tilt was a see-saw affair which saw Jimmy Foxe, in his 24th home run of the season, in the sixth to tie for long range home's with his teammate Bob Johnson. Washington tied the score with a four run rally in the seventh but Crammer's double and Johnson's triple off McColl in the eighth won it. Marcum held Washington eight hits in the second game. Sox Gain Even Break. Nipping the tying rally on a run-down play between third and home to end the game, the White Sox gained an even split in their holiday doubleheader with St. Louis Browns before 14,000. They took the second game 3-2 after Dick Coffman had shut them out 4-0 with two singles in the opener. Coffman allowed only one Chicagoan to reach third in the opener and didn't allow a hit after the third inning. Sam West hit a home run and two singles. Jack Hayes, White Sox second baseman who returned to the game only last Saturday after being out seven weeks because of an elbow operation, suffered a fractured right thumb when taking a wild throw with his bare hand in the first game.

Vancouver Girls Impress In Fast Workouts

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Ont., July 4—Two Halifax girls who hope to earn trips to London in the British Empire Games track and field trials on Friday and Saturday reached here today. They are Aileen Meagher, Dalhousie University 220-yard ace and blackhaird Josephine Labs, who will make the bids in both track and field events. Miss Meagher, a member of the last Olympic squad, will probably start as favorite in the 220-yard race. Preliminary gestures for the trials were given an Olympic touch today when the athletes were barred from little Memorial Stadium and told they would have to work out elsewhere. The Stadium track will be kept clear of competitors until late Friday afternoon when the two-day meet is officially opened. A quartette of Winnipeg sprinters surprised Stadium attendants this morning by getting up early and practicing on the carefully-guarded cinders. It was a short session, the girls being taken to the Queen Park oval where arrivals from Vancouver, Alberta and the Maritimes were warming up. Manitoba's sprint party, including little Genevieve Johns, former University of Manitoba star who was rated one of the most serious contenders for the 220-yard title, impressed a large crowd of onlookers with their speed today. Miss Johns appeared near peak condition and so did Evelyn Goshawk, Elnor Honeyman and Irene King. In charge of the energetic little fireball of women's track, Ann Clark, Secretary of the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada, the strong Vancouver group also had their first workout. Mary Frizzell and tall Lillian Palmer, both Olympic sprinters, flashed brilliant form in practice. Margaret Bell, intermediate Canadian titleholder at the high jump, loomed as the most dangerous rival for Toronto's Eva Dawes, who placed third in the 1932 Olympic Games and is ranked No. 1 in the Empire. Ontario and Quebec entrants started to arrive tonight. Three carloads of Montreal track femininity, in charge of Myrtle Cook McGowan, former Olympic point-winner, got in tonight too late for a workout.

Muscleton S'SIDE TAKES FALCONS INTO CAMP 5-4

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) CLEVELAND, July 4—In a rather colorless victory, Muscleton, owned by the Coldstream Stud Farms of Lexington, Ky., won the annual renewal of the Stallion Stake for three-year-old trotters, the feature event of Grand Circuit racing at North Randall today. The purse, which was worth \$5,830 in 1933, was won in straight heats by the son of Mr. Elwyn, who played with his opposition throughout, trotting his two winning miles in 2:03 2-5 and 2:04 2-5. In the auction betting, Muscleton sold for \$100 and the field \$80, and this made a double for him at the meeting.

RECORD ENTRY LIST EXPECTED FOR TRIALS

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, July 4—"It will be a battle of youth versus experience," remarked Jack Thomas, noted Halifax coach who taught Frankie Nicks how to run. He was referring to the Maritime track and field championships to be held at Halifax Saturday, July 7, when a Maritime team will be chosen to go to Hamilton, Ont., for the Canadian trials for the British Empire Games. Fifty entries have already been sent to Sheriff C. D. Shipley of Amherst, president of the Maritime Provinces Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, including four from Saint John and three from Charlottetown. Most of the others came from towns in Nova Scotia. One of the biggest fields in the history of Maritime meets is forecast for the 100 yards. Twelve prominent sprinters have sent in their names. Most of the well-known athletes of the Maritimes have entered and nearly all record holders will appear. There will be a congregation of senior, junior, interscholastic and intercollegiate champions—something that has never occurred before, because junior athletes could never compete in senior meets and still hold their status as juniors. This ruling has been waived by officials in order to secure the most representative team.

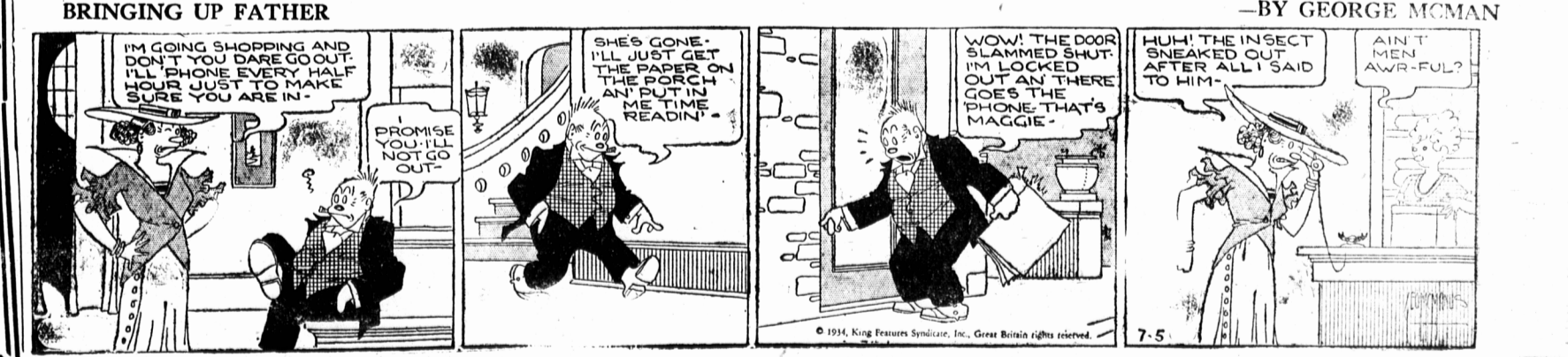
