ART OF FLY MAKING.

There are trout and salmon fishers who pay several thousand dollars a year for the "flies" alone. Few persons can learn to make artificial flies, knotting hairs that can hardly be seen, so the skilled fly maker commands high wages. The materials, too, are costly for the earth is ransacked for feathers and hairs, and one hair wrong makes "all the difference."

The business done in mouse whiskers is considerable, for they are used in the making of a wonderful fly, the "gray roset," and they are expensive, costing nearly two cents a whisker. Trout rise much better at mouse whisker flies than at the same "gnat" dressed in juncocock hackles, which look much like them.

Bears' eyebrows being stiff and exactly the right shade, are used in a fly that has killed quantities of salmon. These eyebrows come from the Himalayan brown bear, and cost about \$1.50 a set.

There are agents all over the world searching tropical forests for the right birds to supply fly hackles. One of the most sought after skins is that of the rare "green screamer," an African bird about the size of a hen, which has a tiny bunch of feathers on each shoulder that are worth \$15 a bunch to the fly maker. One of these birds supplies only feathers enough to make rings for half a dozen flies.

There is no limit to the enthusiasm of an artistic fly tyer, who will use hair from his own eyelashes to finish off an "extra special" fly. Babies' hair is much sought after, if it is of the right shade—golden yellow for all-the-lighter salmon flies, and one curl will make a dozen first-class flies.

It takes an expert only fifteen minutes to turn out a fly, which consists of a tiny hook with wings of Egyptian dove feather, legs of fox hair and a body of mouse fly wound around with a thread of yellow silk. A careless made fly will have neither legs nor "feathers," but the true expert adds the legs and puts on a pair of long "feathers" of cat hair, white at the tips. All these tiny details will be exactly in their places and so firmly tied to the hook that the fly will take half a dozen strong fish and be none the worse.

KEEPING HOUSE IN PERSIA.

Housekeeping in Persia is a more difficult undertaking than in Western countries. The chief reasons for this are the lack of conveniences and the fact that there are many things which in other countries can be bought ready for use must be prepared by the Persian housekeeper. Do you want flour? You must buy your wheat, clean and sift it, and send it to the miller, who lives perhaps a day's journey from you. You must send with the wheat the most trusty servant you have, who will watch the miller day and night to see that he does not take too much toll. You ought of course, to send a second servant to watch the first, but if you began that there would be no end to the number you would have to send.

Do you want sugar? Loaf sugar, granulated sugar, powdered sugar—you cannot buy them. What you can buy is a cone of sugar, about ten inches in diameter, and eighteen inches in height, which comes from Russia or France. If you want lumps of sugar for your coffee, and tea this cone of sugar must be placed on the soft floor and by means

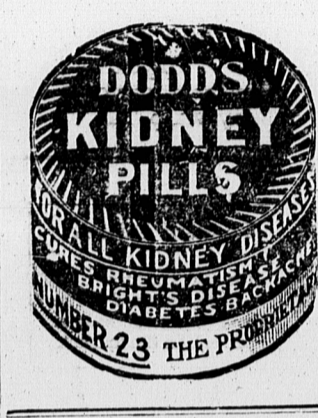

of a hammer broken into pieces. If you want fine sugar these pieces must be then ground with a mortar and pestle. If you wish powdered sugar the fine sugar must be sifted several times. Even in the kitchen of a European, when the sugar is to be used, the cutting and pounding of the sugar must be done on the solid garden floor.

The Persian "range" is merely a row of hollow boxes made of sundried bricks, in which is built a charcoal fire. Over these boxes are placed strips of iron on which the kettle rests. Native country does not include many things that are baked, but if you, an eccentric foreigner demand a cake or pie your ingenious cook will be equal to the occasion. He will prepare beds of glowing coals in two of the boxes. Over one of these he will place the article to be baked. This he will cover with a copper pan and on top of the pan he will place hot coals. The object of the coals in the second box is that the cook may be able to renew the fire in the first box without putting on the fresh coal, which might smoka.

Most Persian implements are very heavy and awkward to handle. For example, working utensils are of copper and bowls for washing clothes are of earthenware. The bowls are small and shallow. The washwoman has no bench on which to place the bowl and no board on which to rub the clothes. Squatted on her heels, with the bowl on the floor, she wears out her hands and the clothes too at a marvelous rate. It looks rather primitive to see a woman sitting beside a watercourse pounding clothes with a stone, but I am not sure that this method, which is universally employed by the poorer people, is not to be preferred to the other.—Los Angeles Times.

CARE FOR FARM MACHINERY

The farm labor problem, which in many instances in recent years reached an acute stage, has worked its own solution. Fewer men are now employed than formerly on the average farm and such men as are available for handling several horses attached to fast-working implements and machinery are the kind wanted. Men of such capabilities cost more to hire than do the average sort, but they are worthy of their hire, as Mr Anson Groh ably points out. That we as farmers generally are coming to a fuller realization of this idea is evidenced in the great and growing amount of machinery that we now believe to be necessary on any well equipped farm. Those of us who are making the greatest headway and who are the strongest believers in the farm as affording an all-round life work are the men who adopt all reasonable labor-saving machinery and devices which have been placed upon the market.

A man advanced the opinion recently that farmers have been getting altogether too much machinery. It is the exception of only a few individuals, he was wrong. No better investment can be made than that of the recently invented labor saving machines which are now becoming common and the great value of which is attested by the very fact that so many of them are being bought by our conservative, hard-thinking farmers.

WHAT IS A DAIRYMAN?

There seems to be a misunderstanding as to just what is meant by the term dairyman. If you speak to the average business man about a dairyman he immediately thinks of the man who drives a milk cart and rings a bell or delivers bottles in the small hours of the morning. He thinks of the dairyman as the man who brings the milk to his door and not as the man who takes care of the cattle that produce the milk. As a matter of fact the old idea of the dairyman is extremely limited. The men who deliver the milk constitute a very small percentage of the dairymen of the country. Indeed in many instances they are not dairymen at all but rather jobbers and retailers. In cities of any size the milk is brought by a business man and passed out to the consumer very much as sugar, flour and meat are handled by the average dealer. Of course, there is a difference in the mode of delivery, for the milkman has a constant

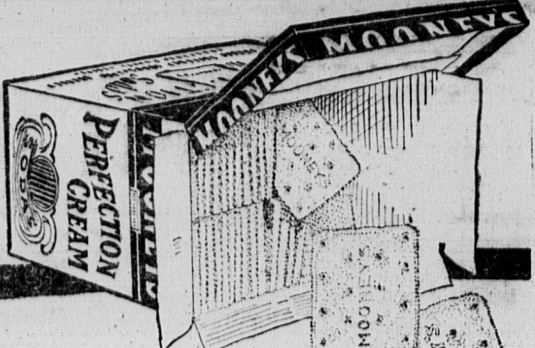

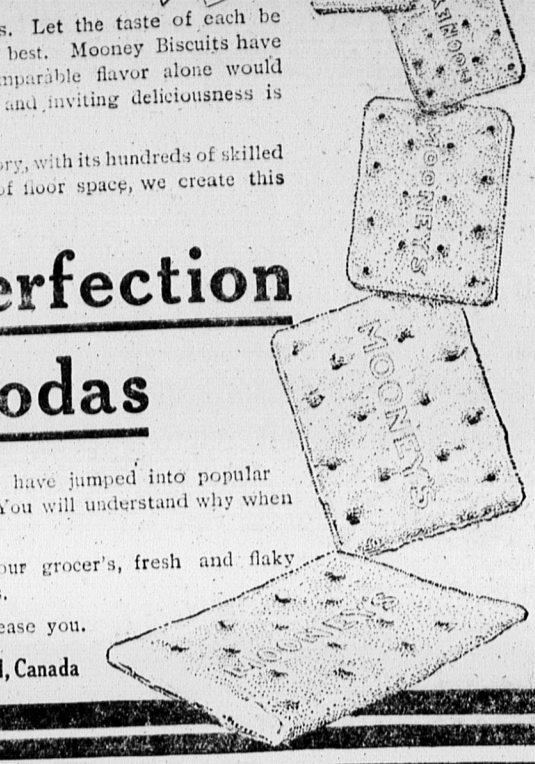
