RECRUITING POSTERS.—Major Bartlett has received from the Parliamentary Committee, 12 Dowling St., London, a selection of recruiting posters as used in Great Britain, to encourage the enlistment of volunteers for the front. These are seventy-five different designs, all most striking and effective. ANNUAL HORSE SHOW.—The Directors of the Horse Breeders' Association are again preparing for the Annual Horse Show, which is to be held this spring. A meeting will be held at an early date to prepare the Prize List. At the last Annual Meeting it was suggested that a class for Percherons should be opened, also a class for Standard Bred Stallions, and for Roadster mares. Several suggestions have already been made to the directors. One, that there should be an Agricultural class open to mares and geldings, another is that classes for light horses should be for Carriage stallions and mares registered, and for carriage mares sired by registered stallions, and not eligible for registration. A third suggestion regarding light horses is that there should be a class for Carriage stallions and Carriage mares: for Standard Bred stallions and Standard Bred or Roadster mares. The Committee will welcome suggestions which can be handed any of the directors: H. H. Acorn, Souris; David Reid, Victoria Cross; W. W. Crosby, Cornwall; T. P. Cass, North River; John Richards, M. L. A., Bideford; and Jabez Lee, Victoria.

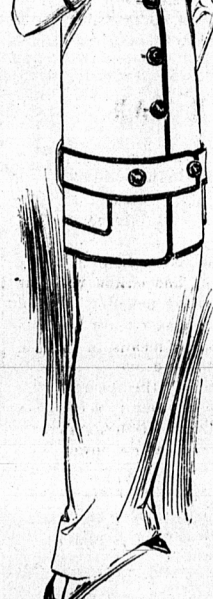
