## NEW ZEPPELINS FOR GERMANS

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—Two "double" Zeppelins, each with a carrying capacity of sixty tons, have been constructed in Germany to carry mail between Berlin and the United States in seventy-two hours, according to Morris Epstein, who returned to Chicago today from Europe. Epstein said he had seen both the giant airships, one christened America and the other Deutschland.

The new merchant Zeppelins are 700 feet long and unarmed, he explained. The carriage resembles the hulk of a ship and is floated by two huge gas bags, instead of a single bag as in the Zeppelins now in use. They will carry mail only.

In Germany the regular postage and a mark additional will be charged on all mail for the United States. In the United States postage to Germany on these ships will be the regular 2 cent, and 25 cents in addition. Each ship can carry sixty tons of mail.

As for hostile aeroplanes, the ships can rise to an altitude higher than 23,000 feet, reached by heavier than air machines. Once inside the three mile limit on the Atlantic coast of the United States, the Zeppelins, will descend and come in on the water to meet the requirements of the statutes.

## King George's Reply To U. S. President

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—President Wilson had on his list of callers today Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British Ambassador, who was to present King George's reply to the President's appeal to all the European belligerents for an agreement permitting the shipment of relief supplies into positions of Poland occupied by Teutonic armies.

The reply was said to follow the position already laid down by the Allies that Germany's insistence upon the right to feed her garrisons on Polish products, makes it impossible for them to allow her supplies to go into the country through their lines.

## Land On Which Zeppelin Fell Is Presented to Nation

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 LONDON, Sept. 8.—The site on the hillside at Cuffley where Lieut. William Leafe Robinson, of the Royal Flying Corps, brought down a Zeppelin during the German air raid on Saturday has been presented to the nation by its owner, Mrs. Kidston. The grant is made with the understanding that a suitable monument shall be erected by public subscription on the spot where the Zeppelin fell.

## Operations On Macedonian Front

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 PARIS, Sept. 7.—The French official statement reporting operations in Macedonia, says:

"Army of the East: On the front as a whole there was an intermittent cannonade, except in the sectors of Poroj and Dodelz, west of Lake Doiran, which the enemy violently bombarded."

"A British cruiser effectively beat down the fire of Bulgarian batteries in the direction of the lower Struma."

"The French aerial service took an active part in the recent actions on the Somme front, says the French official statement. In air flights yesterday two German machines were brought down by French pilots, and forced to descend in a damaged condition. The text of the statement reporting the aeroplanes activity, says:

"During an air fight which took place yesterday, two machines were brought down by our pilots. One fell in the direction of Guedecourt, and the other in the neighborhood of Bric-En-Santerre."

"Four of the German machines were forced to descend damaged."

## GERMANS CLAIM 20,000 ROMANIAN PRISONERS

BERLIN, Sept. 7.—An official statement is to the effect that more than 20 thousand Romanians were taken prisoners when German and Bulgarian troops captured the Rumanian fortress of Turtukai and that more than 100 guns were also taken. Turtukai is one of a series of fortresses defending Bucharest from the south. It is situated on the southern bank of the Danube opposite Olamis, from which town a railroad runs to Bucharest. German army headquarters announced Wednesday that German and Bulgarian troops had stormed seven of Turtukai works including the armored batteries of the position.

## OFFICIAL

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 LONDON, Sept. 7.—An official statement reporting military operations in Macedonia was issued by the British government as follows:

"Saloniki:—On the Struma front several raids were made by our patrols on enemy trenches. Some prisoners were captured."

The Royal Navy successfully shelled a battalion of enemy infantry concentrated opposite Neochari (in eastern Greek Macedonia near Orfan). On the Doiran front there was considerable artillery action. Hostile guns, which were shelling Vindoeje, were silenced. We shot down an enemy aeroplane which fell in flames into Lake Doiran."

(Special to the Guardian.)  
 LONDON, Sept. 7.—A British official statement says: The general situation is unchanged. Our artillery yesterday our machines bombarded an important railway junction on the enemy's lines, causing great damage to the station and rolling stock. One of the enemy's aerodromes was bombed. One machine was destroyed on the ground, and other damage was done. Many other points of military importance were bombed. Good work was done from low altitudes in locating positions which were reached by our troops. Three hostile machines were wrecked and four others driven down in a damaged condition. Two of our machines are missing.
