### IN MEMORIAM

#### MRS. ABRAM DICKSON.

On the morning of Tuesday, March 12th, there passed away at the home of Mr. George Poole, Lower Montague, one who was well and favorably known in almost all parts of southern King's county—for she was one of the older residents—in the person of Mrs. Adam Dickson. At the time of her death Mrs. Dickson was seventy-nine years of age, but had enjoyed a fine constitution all her life, and until the end was considered a lady of more than ordinary activity for her age. However, during the last few months of her life she had been unwell, medical opinion being that her end might be very sudden. And so it was, for the evening before her death she seemed in usual health; but early in the morning she felt an attack of illness, and soon fell asleep in Jesus. As she had been for a number of years a close friend of the Poole family, their sorrow at her sudden departure was very real. On the afternoon of that day her body was conveyed to the old homestead, following a short service at the home of Mr. Poole. From her former home, which was her home to the last, and where she was held in loving respect, the funeral was held on Thursday afternoon, when a large concourse of people followed the remains to the Murray Harbor North cemetery—the religious services being conducted by Rev. M. Sutherland, the deceased being for many years a consistent member of the Presbyterian church. Mrs. Dickson's husband died in the year 1886, and since that time she gave her life entirely to promoting the happiness and comfort of her family in different parts of the country. She was truly a wonderful woman, considering it not only a duty but a grand privilege to be able to go to the assistance of those who were in need of what help she could give. Having made several trips to the homes of her friends in the United States, and having always found the greatest pleasure in her errands of mercy there, she was an interesting acquaintance and a dearly loved friend. Two sons and three daughters survive, namely, Thomas on the home-stand, Charles in Taunton, Mass., Mrs. Carney D. MacLure and Mrs. David Smeath on Murray Harbor North, and Mrs. William Appleton at Taunton, Mass. One daughter, Lucy, having died a number of years ago. To the living relatives and friends there remains the very appropriate assurance that "She rests from her labors, and her works do follow her."

#### MRS. PEPPER DUNN

There passed peacefully away at her home, Spring Hill, on the morning of March 15th, Mrs. Peppere Dunn, aged 80th year. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Smith, who emigrated from England in the year 1840 and settled down in the year 1844. Her husband, Mr. Peppere Dunn, predeceased her thirty years ago. She was a woman of sterling character, a good and kind neighbor, ever ready to help the poor and needy. She bore her trials and sufferings with Christian resignation, leaving everything to the divine will of God. She leaves to mourn two sons and two daughters, namely John Thomas, James Emmet, Mary, Etta and Elizabeth Angelina, all at home. Also one brother, and one sister, namely, Mr. Thomas Smith of Middleton, and Mrs. James M. Duffy, Shamrock, survive her. She was attended by her pastor, Rev. Father Murphy, who administered the last rites of the Catholic church and performed the services at the church and grave. The pall bearers were H. B. Haslam, Samuel Abbott, P. L. Cash, Francis Lawless, Ronald MacDonald and M. T. Lambie. May her soul rest in peace.

#### A GILT-EDGED TRADE FOR CANADA IN 1919.

Tourist "trade" gives quickest returns for service of any commerce any land can undertake. Payment, cash "on the spot" is for exactly those things which the people produce and originate themselves. In that sense tourist trade forms a most valuable national asset of "gilt-edged import" of practically nothing but dollars.

It is an aspect of Canadian trade which must not be overlooked in this year of difficult re-adaptation to peace conditions.

The Trade Adviser of the Pan American Union, and International Organization maintained by the twenty Latin American republics and the United States for the development among other things of friendly intercourse, writes to the Canadian Trade Commission as follows:—

"I am inclined to think that all parts of Canada could receive thousands of tourists from the United States during the coming summer if special efforts were made by the Dominion to let it be known generally in this country that Canada wants tourists to come. Possibly articles in journals and magazines, calling special attention to the delightful climate of Canada, the fishing possibilities, the scenery and other attractions would induce more than usual thought being given to that country.

Our people who may be a bit more settled than during the war years, "wish to go somewhere," and as they cannot go to Europe, or Mexico, and as South America is too far away and passports too difficult to obtain, our own western country and Canada then become more or less Mecca."
