The classification of foxes will be the same as last year with the same number of classes, namely, Class 1, Black and Extra Dark with not more than 15 percent silver; Class 2, Dark Silver with 15 to 30 percent silver; Class 3, Dark Medium Silver with 30 to 45 percent silver; Class 4, Medium Silver with 45 to 60 percent silver; Class 5, Light Medium Silver with 60 to 70 percent silver; Class 6, Pale Silver, over 70 percent silver. These will have 6 sections each, three for males and three for females. The same words and championships classes will also be in the catalogue but new additions are matched pair, adults; matched pair, pups.
