# TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE

In the Y.M.C.A. on Tuesday, the annual convention of the Provincial Branch of the Dominion Temperance was held. There was an unusually large attendance, all parts of the Province being represented.

Two very enthusiastic meetings were held—one in the afternoon and one in the evening.

After the opening of the convention, and the usual routine, the reports of the provincial prohibition inspectors were read, showing that the law was being well enforced in their territory of Queen's and Prince County. No other inspectors were present. Serious complaints were made regarding the ineffectiveness of the inspectors for King's County.

Addresses were given on the present condition of affairs by R. H. McDonald, St. Eleanor's; Hon. J. M. Clark, A. P. Prowse, M.L.A.; J. K. Ross, Rev. R. G. Sinclair, Rev. W. J. Wason, Arch. McDonald, Murray Harbor, Wm. McLeod, Dundas; In-pector, Rev. Wm. Phelan, Rev. H. E. Thomas, L. U. Fowler, C. W. Crosby, Bonshaw, E. D. Fraser and many others.

The following resolutions were passed:—  
1st. That this Alliance is of the opinion that the inspector in each county would be more in the line of Temperance work, provided a sufficient salary be given to enable them to devote their whole time to the work.

2nd. In view of the gross abuse of the law on the part of many doctors, in giving prescriptions for professedly medicinal purposes the inspectors are strongly urged to put the law in force wherever there are plain cases of its violation.

3rd. That this Alliance places itself on record as opposed to the existence of clubs where liquor is dispensed giving as they do a privileged class, and being most pernicious in their effect on young men and exerting a baneful influence on the community.

Whereas petitions are circulated from time to time to secure the liberation of convicted liquor sellers and the prerogative of the Lieutenant Governor invoked to this end the Alliance wish to record their strong disapproval of such proceedings as it is in the interests of justice that the penalties of the law be carried out without fear or favor.

Whereas vendors who were not at all asked for or needed have been appointed in Prince and Queen's Counties and whereas their dismissal has frequently asked for in Prince County at least, where the names of the vendors of Prince Co., Angus McDonald, was to-day convicted by Stipendiary McQuarrie of violating the conditions of his license by vending liquor for beverage purposes and without prescription; Therefore Resolved that the immediate dismissal of the said guilty vendor be demanded of the Government.

Following is a summary from the address delivered by the President, Rev. A. E. Burke, who occupied the chair at both meetings:—  
"The Prohibition Act, tested sufficiently in this Capital, and here found workable, has not, we must admit, been extended to the whole Province with such beneficent results. The country, we may well claim, is now pretty free from the illicit distilleries that, for years, have prostituted the youth and the soul of our people. Remove the occasion, and many weak men, otherwise unable to restrain themselves, will be sober, industrious, and estimable citizens. We have had the opportunity of verifying this contention; and to our own education. The question of the towns and villages is more difficult.

"The moral condition of the community, in so far as it is involved in the temperance issue, is largely attributable to two or three classes of people. Assuming that the provincial Prohibition Act is a good one, that the Government stands solidly

behind it,—(and otherwise how could it hold office a day?) The Inspectors and magistrates must be held responsible for the general execution of the law; then the responsibility of the doctors and druggists forms the other main factor. The Magistrates, while for the most part some what chary in the matter,—of tea more so than justice, or conscientious requirements,—are obliged to make convictions, when the conditions of the law have been complied with and there is a sufficiency of evidence to warrant their so doing. The Inspectors,—in some cases at least,—are in the hands of the Magistrates; these write out informations issue documents, and, if they so desire,—can let loose the malefactor, then, that none but strictly upright magistrates, men learned in their profession, temperate in their own habits, and hearty sympathizing with temperance, should be appointed to administer such a law is not mere pettifoggery hoist-in-responsibility by the power of political expediency. The necessity of the Stipendiary Magistrate's being a lawyer of two years' standing, places the whole administration of the law in many instances, in the hands of some utterly incompetent, and unsympathetic person; one who, by his inconsequent conduct, quickly makes the success of statutory temperance impossible. The last state of a community under such administration is worse than the first; and it were necessary, I should think, for our legislators to consider whether there are not other interests than those of the lawyers,—whether there are no other men as capable of giving common-sense judgment as some of the stipendiary magistrates now authority.

"We are loth to bring serious culpability home to a professional class whose honor should be at all times above reproach. We should be very sorry to charge venality and wrongdoing to the medical doctors as a whole. Happily the majority of them are conscientious and virtue-loving men; but unfortunately there is an element, mixed with the rank and file, whose sympathies are with liquor and liquor-drinking,—an element composed of individuals who are themselves, sad to say, often the victims of drink. Then again, the competition now so sharp among medical practitioners induces men who are often well-meaning to grant prescriptions, which, under the cloak of medicine, procure liquor for beverage purposes for an undesirable clientele. Some of the worst offenders here, too, are found loudly invoking their personal honor, and the honor of the profession, while they do things that very materially compromise all honor—both personal and professional. If the profession were what it pretends to be we should have a soberer and more decorous community.

"As to the druggists, it would appear that we have enough of them, and to spare in this little Province. Time was when the druggists were men of the staunchest character. But we see things happening every day in this community, which prove unequivocally that by some sad turn of the wheel of fate, weaklings have got into the places of honest men. "All are ready to admit that the drug store nuisance and the vendor imposition form a fruitful frustration of the operation of our temperance laws. Something must be done to combat the seductive influence of the unprincipled pharmacist. The law must be made to effect his correction or his complete suppression.
