LIEUT. HOOPER'S MEDAL.—Mrs. D. L. Hooper, mother of Lieutenant Parke Hooper, of No. 2 Canadian Siege Battery, now in France, has received for safe keeping, the Military Cross which was won by Lieut. Hooper some time ago. The Medal is inset in a handsome case and has a bar with the three stripes. Among these views is a panoramic picture, which is eight feet long and when placed on the wall presents the exact picture of the trenches and firing lines as they are today.

105th OFFICERS NOW IN FRANCE.—It is learned that Major T. Edgar MacNutt, City, and Major John A. Stewart, Union Road, who at the time of the amalgamation of the 105th and 104th Battalions, proceeded with the other half of the 105th and 104th boys to form the 13th Reserve Battalion under Colonel George Fowler, have been in France for some time. The marked ability of these two Island Majors who each had charge of the company in the Reserves, was noted by the Imperial authorities, and each was selected for different spheres of action with the Imperial Forces. CHRISTMAS STOCKINGS FOR SOLDIERS.—Mrs. Adelaide M. Plump, Honorary Secretary of the Canadian Red Cross Society has issued an appeal to the Secretaries of the Provincial and District branches stating that the Canadian Society had received from England a request for 30,000 Christmas stockings for the men in the hospitals overseas. She suggests that it is desirable that the stockings be as nearly uniform in value and contents as possible and that they be ready for shipment not later than October 1st, as they must be in England by the beginning of November. No case of stockings must exceed 56 pounds in weight and a list of the contents, especially those of a dutiable nature must be placed on the outside of the case. It is suggested that each stocking might contain one gift of each of the following classes:

- (1) Pocket mirror, cheap style, pocket knife, pipe or match box. (2) Writing pad and envelopes; fancy pocket cards. (3) Cigarettes, tobacco. (4) Candles, chewing gum, maple sugar. (5) Handkerchiefs, necktie, socks. (6) Game, book, puzzle, mouth organ. (7) Toilet requisites such as soap, toilet powder, tooth paste, pin cushion. (8) Packets of raisins, dates or figs, nuts. The stocking to be about 18 inches long with 12 inch foot. No sticky candy or matches must be put in.
