**A PRECIOUS TRAIN.**—There will be run on the P. E. I. Railway from Tignish to Charlottetown on Friday, if present arrangements are not interfered with, a special train which will probably in its freight value be the most precious that has ever been run on any railroad in this Dominion, or indeed in any part of the world. The freight of this train will consist of fifty-four silver black foxes, the most costly animals in the world at present, and of a total valuation approximating a million dollars of hard cash. This notable occurrence will be in connection with the transference of the stock of the Dalton Silver Black Fox Company from their present quarters at Tignish to the new ranch which has been secured on the Forty-eight Road about a mile from Southport. The

work of preparing this ranch has been pushed on very rapidly, and it is expected to be ready to receive its furry occupants on Friday. The special train will consist of a freight car, a baggage car, and a passenger car. The transference will be made under the personal supervision of the President of the Company, the Hon. Charles Daiton.

**A SILVER BLACK BEAUTY.**—Those who attend the Exhibition in Charlottetown this week will be given a chance of seeing one of the silver black beauties that have made the name of the Island ring on the fur exchanges of the world. In the window of Prowse Bros. Ltd., Victoria Row and Queen Street, will be placed for all who wish to view its lustrous coat of silver black, a little animal that is full of life and cunning and carries money in its back. It is a pup specially selected and is claimed to be the best pup in the world today, from a litter of this spring's foxes from The Charles Dalton Ranch. The beauty will be in the window during the whole of Wednesday and Thursday and the large number of people who have, as yet, not seen a black fox will appreciate this opportunity.

**WEDDING BELLS.**—A quiet wedding took place at the home of the bride at Three Brooks, N. S., on Wednesday, when Miss Eliza, eldest daughter of the late Roderick Grant, was united in marriage to Mr. Henry Williams, who has been for some time a popular clerk in the hardware firm of James F. Carson, says the New Glasgow Standard. The ceremony was performed by Rev. L. H. McLean, in the presence of the immediate relatives of the contracting parties. 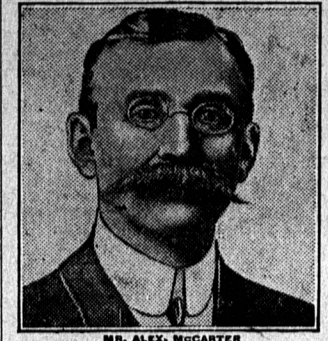
Arrived at the cemetery, His Lordship and attendant priests took their position on a platform erected in front of the Calvary Cross. The Band rendered the Dead march, after which the Rev. Dr. McLellan recited the Litany for the Dead. This was followed by two psalms effectively rendered by the Cathedral choir, accompanied by the League of the Cross orchestra.

His Lordship then preached an eloquent and forceful sermon his subject being prayers for the dead. The Libera was then sung and the service concluded. About two hundred took part in the parade and it is estimated that there was a total attendance of five thousand people at the service.

**AN ISLAND AUTHOR.**—Greek Imperialism is the title of a very brilliant and scholarly book issued from the press of the Houghton Mifflin Co., of New York, written by Dr. W. F. Ferguson, son of the late Senator Ferguson of Prince Edward Island. Dr. Ferguson is now Professor of Ancient History in Harvard University. He is well known in this province where his mother and sisters live on the old farmstead at Marshfield. He is one of the Island's brilliant sons and is already well known in the literary world. The present work although dealing with ancient history is very interesting to present day readers in view of the close parallelism between the development of imperial government in Greece and certain present tendencies to be observed in our own day both in England and in Canada. Besides explaining the successive phases of imperialism, Dr. Ferguson dwells on the working and safeguards of direct popular government and considers the relations of local and federal authorities in federation.
