Last evening the bishop confirmed at Christ church, Amherst. While at Amherst he will be the guest of the Hon. A. R. and Mrs. Dickey.—Amherst Press.

A DESPATCH to The Herald from Truro says:—Rev. F. S. Coffin, Dr. D. Murray, Steviacke, and Rev. Clarence McKinnon, of Halifax, sail next week on the Briardene for Bordenux. They will visit Scotland, England and France for three months, taking in the Paris exposition. The Briardene carries lumber for Alfred Dickie, and it will be a novel trip.

THE Pastime Athletic Club of Kentville, telephoned to the city yesterday asking if Frank Stephen would participate in the sports at Kentville on May 24th if Duffy, the American champion, took part. Frank has not had a racing shoe on since last season, but is rather inclined to go to Kentville if Duffy will be there. The chief difficulty in the way is that Frank is a lieutenant in the 66th P. L. F., and is expected to take part in the Queen's birthday review here.—Halifax Chronicle.

In referring to the death of Mr. John J. Crawford the Idaho State Tribune of Wallace, Idaho says: John James Crawford, father of A. C. Crawford, died this morning at 5 o'clock. He had been sick only a few days with pneumonia, but being very old and feeble he could not withstand the disease. Mr. Crawford was 82 years old and had been in feeble health for several months. His wife preceded him to the grave only a little more than a year ago. Mr. Crawford came to Wallace only one year ago from Tryon, Prince Edward Island. A son and a daughter with whom he made his home reside in Wallace. The funeral services will be held at the Methodist church at 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon, Rev. Mr. Brown officiating. The deceased was a very devout and conscientious Christian, and a quiet student of matters religious.

ONE of the handsomest trophies sent home from South Africa by our brave boys is a Free State ensign, captured by Private Nacy Dorion at Modder River on the occasion of the capture of Gen. Cronje and his army. The flag is about eight feet in length by four feet in breadth, the field being marked by alternate longitudinal stripes of white and yellow, three of yellow and two of white with the yellow stripes on the outside. The canton in the upper right hand corner is marked by red, white and blue stripes nine inches in breadth by three feet long. The flag, which is on view at THE GUARDIAN counting room, is now the property of Miss Emeline Croak of THE GUARDIAN composing room. The Boers in common with all other warlike peoples are very reluctant to lose their colors in battle, and defend them with great courage and stubbornness, but this is the first time they have met Canadians in warfare. Private Dorion deserves to be very proud of his fine trophy, and his fellow Islanders at home will share in the feeling.

Names of Talking Machines.

They are called Graphophones by the United States Patent Office.

In the popular mind there is considerable misapprehension and confusion regarding the correct designation of talking machines. The words Graphophone and Phonograph are ordinarily misused as having the same meaning. The name Phonograph which was given to the first crude model constructed by Edison, has clung in large measure to the perfected talking machine as it is known to-day.

It is news, therefore, to many people to learn that all the talking machines of the present day are officially termed Graphophones by the U. S. Patent Office.

In 1877, the attention of the world was riveted to a new invention by Thomas A. Edison, of a machine that would talk, to which he applied the name Phonograph. Imaginative people at once begin extravagant speculations as to the many uses to which it could be put. The mechanical methods employed in it, however, were incapable of practical use. It employed tin-foil as the medium for receiving and reproducing the sound waves and a record made on this material was not permanent, was far from being perfect or even satisfactory, and it could not be removed from the particular instrument on which it was made without destroying the record. The phonograph served to demonstrate that sound waves could be recorded and reproduced, but it could render no practical service to mankind and disappointed expectations. In the course of a few years it was forgotten.

The Graphophone appeared ten years after the Phonograph. It was invented in the Volta Laboratory, Washington, B. C., as the results of experiments conducted by Alexander Graham Bell, of telephone fame, and his associates, Dr. Chichester Bell and Prof. Sumner Tainter. Its great improvement over the phonograph, and the feature which revived interest in the talking machine and made it of practical value, was in providing a method of cutting and engraving a record upon a wax-like tablet or cylinder. This discovery makes possible permanent records that can be taken from the machine on which they were made and reproduced on the same or other instruments.

The Patent Office has put into the Graphophone Class all similar inventions, including Edison's; and technically speaking, every practical talking machine in the United States to-day is a Graphophone.

30,000 Suits of Khaki Uniforms.

HAMILTON, Ont., May 14.—The Sanford Manufacturing Company is hard at work on an order for 30,000 khaki uniforms for the Imperial troops now fighting in South Africa. The contract calls for delivery of the uniforms in four months, in lots of 2,000 per week. The material to be used is now in stock in the Sanford warehouses, and comprises 550 bales of goods. While the uniforms are to be shipped direct to the Imperial authorities, the business of the contract is being done through the Dominion government, which has placed an inspector on the work, and which will hand over the money from the British government to the Sanford Company, when the contract is completed.

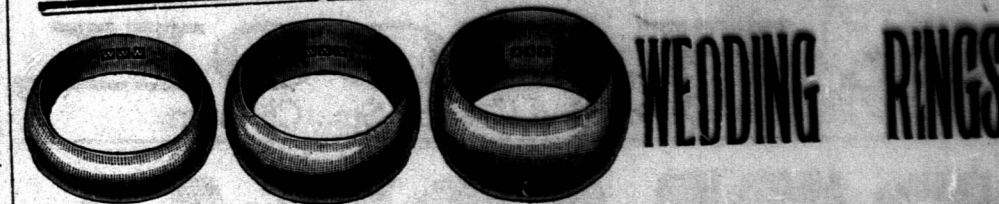
