### Suggest Open Season For Judges

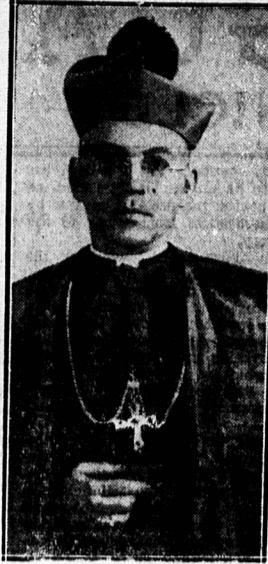
(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 21 — County Judge M. B. Tudhope of Leeds today suggested there should be an open season for judges, two or three weeks a year, during which the judges might express themselves. He spoke on freedom of the press and freedom of speech at a luncheon of the Eastern Ontario Municipal Association.

"Freedom of speech is a delicate thing for a judge to discuss," he said. "My friend the judge of Middlesex spoke out in meeting

and there was a great roar from the papers who, like most exponents of freedom, believed in it more enthusiastically for themselves than for others.

"I suggest there should be an open season for judges—say two or three weeks in the year conveniently spaced—so they may express themselves ad lib, thus greatly reducing the danger of apoplexy and ingrowing temper."

Judge Tudhope's reference to the judge of Middlesex, Joseph Wearing, concerned a speech Judge Wearing made in Toronto several months ago in which he criticized legislation passed by provincial legislatures in Quebec, Ontario and Al-

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### In Memoriam

#### REV. W. R. GEORGE

The death of Rev. William Richard George occurred in Vancouver, B. C., on September 3rd, 1927. Mr. George was born in London Ontario, in 1875 and received his education in Port Elgin, Western University and Huron College where he gained his L. Th. in 1898. He was ordained priest in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, in 1899 and went to Alberta shortly afterwards.

He was rural dean of Edmonton 1908-1910, and grand Chaplain of the A. F. and A. M. in Alberta 1909.

Going to the Diocese of New Westminster twenty-five years ago Mr. George was rector of the Church of St. John The Divine, Central Park; St. Barnabas, New Westminster; and St. Augustines, Marpole.

Ill-health caused him to retire a year ago.

He took an active part in the work of the diocese and was clerical secretary from 1917 to 1928.

Mr. George is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Lucy Blanche Sims, of Kensington Prince Edward Island; also one sister and two brothers.—B.
