The western mail train yesterday was delayed a considerable length of time at Summerside, having waited for connection with the Empress which was late in leaving Point Du Chene. The train arrived here at one o'clock this morning, being three hours and ten minutes late. The Murray Harbour train and the morning train from the east were each five minutes late and the Cape Traverse train was fifty minutes late. The morning train from the west and the afternoon train from the east were on time.

Storer of Atlanta, Ga., and Paymaster Auld mysteriously assaulted Dr. Edward Spencer Cowles at a navy hop in Charlestown, Mass., last December, the young couple have tried to keep their engagement from the public. Very few invitations have been issued for the wedding. The families of the bride and bridegroom will follow the event. Joseph Auld, editor of the Burlington News, father of Paymaster Auld, with his family are here for the event. Just what connection, if any, the breaking of Miss Swift's engagement with Mr. Storer had with the encounter which her present fiancé had with Dr. Cowles, who is a cousin of Rear Admiral W. S. Cowles, U. S. N., has not been disclosed. They were to have been married in December, 1909. When Mr. Storer went to Boston it was announced that the wedding had been postponed indefinitely because of the illness of Miss Swift. The Joseph Auld referred to above is the father of Paymaster Auld and a native of Freetown, P. E. Island. He is well known in this city, visiting here every summer, and last year came into prominence on account of his criticism of hotels here.

The Department of Agriculture is in receipt of a circular from the College of Agriculture, Truro, N. S., announcing the short courses which are to begin on Jan. 3rd., 1911. The courses will be along the same lines as in former years. The faculty of the college will be assisted by representatives from the Department of Agriculture, at Ottawa, and from the Department of Agriculture, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island, and by successful farmers in dairying and fruit growing &c. &c. Ladies' courses will also be held which will be conducted by the teachers of the Truro School of Domestic Science.

King's County news from the East: In the matter of old persons, this part of the country compares favorably with other parts. Brady Campbell, of Fairfield, passed away a few weeks ago at the age of 100 years, and 12 days. Miss Mary McDonald, of Black Point, died a few days ago, aged 94. Mrs. Angus McLellan, Red Point, is in her 91st year. Richard LaPierre, a native of Chesetcook, N. S., but now living with his son Edward at Black Point, is in his 90th year, hale and hearty. He goes to the woods every day and cut 200 rails recently. Fishing is dull here this fall and is not pursued with the same vigor as in other years. Seth McLean and the LaPierre family are trawling at Basin Head, but bait is scarce and weather unfavorable for large results. Miss Carrie Publicover arrived home from Gloucester recently.

The closing of the hardest election campaign ever fought in the annals of St. Dunstan's College Mock Parliament took place Wednesday night in the college Assembly Hall. For the past ten weeks the candidates J. J. MacIsaac, (Government), and C. J. Macdonald, (Opposition), and their respective colleagues carried and re-carried, argued, discussed and expounded the questions at issue; but Wednesday night the Opposition candidate scored a magnificent victory with a majority of thirteen. Mr. MacIsaac all through the campaign put up an excellent fight and for a time the house seemed to be evenly divided, but Macdonald by his dauntless skill as an orator and knowledge of public affairs, which characterized him as well in the past, as in the present, forged himself ahead, and by a series of excellent speeches and keen canvassing completely routed his opponent. The two hours prior to the election were devoted to speech making, and efforts of both parties are deserving of the highest commendation. The first session of the Parliament opened on Wednesday, Dec. 14th, with the opposition under the leadership of the Hon. Jas. Rooney vs. Power.

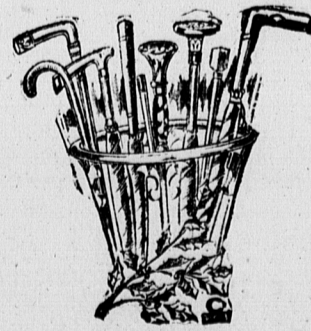
