"NEWS" FOR THE TURKS. Turkish papers, printed in Constantinople in the first week in July not only announced the fact that Italy was doomed, the capture of Verdun by the Germans, and the flight of the French Government to England, but also told of the preparations that had been made to invade Egypt and capture the Suez Canal.

"The Desperate Plight of Italy: Italy is in a position from which she cannot escape without disaster. The Austrian armies will be in Milan in a few days and Rome will be taken within a month.

"On the other hand, the Turkish army crossing the Suez Canal and occupying Egypt will soon be masters of Northern Africa. Then Italian statesmen, full of repentance at the sight of a ruined Italy, will ask pity of their former allies, but it will be too late."

"Turkey does not intend to submit to the check sustained by her first expedition against Egypt, and preparations have for the last two months been openly made for recommencing the enterprise as soon as the season is so far advanced as to prevent the pampered Franks from venturing forth under the desert sun."

OPENS PULPITS TO THE WOMEN

LONDON, August 27.—Rev. Percy Dearmer, one of London's most prominent clergymen, makes a novel contribution to the controversy which has been hotly raging some time past over the question: Should women preach?

A great national mission is being organized by the Anglican church, and in view of the fact that so many clergymen are away doing Chaplaincy work, it was suggested that women might conduct certain parts of the services, including delivering addresses. A majority of the Bishops, however, vetoed the proposal.

Dearmer, whose first wife held a great position in artistic and literary circles in London, and died a few months ago nursing in the Balkans, remarried recently. He has now written an article advocating preaching by women, in the course of which he says: "Women ask to be treated on equal terms with men. Their powers and gifts, it is true, are different, but they ask for equality of opportunity, so that their different gifts and qualities may be used in the best possible way. We let them do heavy manual labor for which they are not suited. We have no right to prevent them from speaking and teaching in public, a task for which they are eminently qualified. Indeed, I never heard a woman make a really bad speech. On the other hand, when I think of men I have heard on the platforms, at dinner tables, and in the pulpit, a dumb feeling of despair overtakes me, especially when I think of sermons that are listened to every Sunday, which, indeed, a majority of our population refuses nowadays to listen to."
