Mr. Brown concludes from his observations and interviews with market men that five essential points have to be observed in the building up of a satisfactory trade in the British market: (1) High standard of quality; (2) Absolute uniformity in grading; (3) Proper weights with a minimum of tolerance; (4) Attractive display, including both packages and individual birds; (5) Delicacy of quality and flavour that is pleasing to the consumer.

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN MCLEOD

On January 17th, 1933, the home of our respected fellow citizens, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander McLeod, 3 King Square was sorely and suddenly darkened by the heart-breaking loss of their only son John, a beautiful and most promising lad of fourteen years.

He was a very diligent boy at school and last summer successfully passed the entrance examinations to Prince of Wales College and attended it since the September opening.

On Saturday previous to his death he was about as usual, enjoying the Christmas holidays and looking forward to the College re-opening the following Friday. Suddenly he was ill and on Monday the Doctor pronounced it scarlet fever and on Wednesday, despite all that love and skill could do he passed away. A crushing blow to his parents and sisters, it has brought gloom to the whole community and called forth a great volume of cordial sympathy.

John was an unassuming and unusually promising student, a fine manly lad, who awoke in all who knew him prophecies of a brilliant career. He was the idol of his parent's hearts, an obedient and considerate son at home and a popular and unselfish comrade with his fellows. The ways of God who should allow such a tragedy are past finding out. It is only for us to bow the head in faithful submission and say "Thy will be done."

To the bereaved parents and his sister Jessie who is now a student nurse at the P. E. Island Hospital, tenderest sympathy goes out from a very large circle of friends and relatives, reminding the bereaved that with this treasure in Heaven, it is better to have loved and lost than never to have loved at all.

On Thursday a brief funeral service conducted by Rev. Dr. Ramsay and Rev. Ewen McDougall and Rev. C. N. Brown was held on the lawn as the house was under quarantine.

The remains were taken by motor hearse for interment in the family plot in Valleyfield cemetery where a short service was conducted by Rev. D. M. Sinclair assisted by Rev. Dr. Ramsay and Rev. J. M. McLeod.

Rev. Mr. Sinclair in his address, spoke very feelingly about the deceased, as John had been a faithful member of the Young People's Society of his church while he lived in Valleyfield for two years previous to his entering Prince of Wales College.

He quoted from the poet "Young" that Death loves "a shining mark", and that this was certainly true in this case as he was a lad full of life and vigor, a good scholar of great promise with all the world before him, beloved by his chums, a devoted son, truly a "shining mark." The pall bearers were six of his Valleyfield companions, Myles McPherson, Wallace McPherson, Angus McDonald, Milton McLeod, Calum Martin and Angus Nicholson. The floral tributes were many and beautiful and these expressions of sympathy along with the many others that doubtless reached the stricken parents, will, we hope, in some small measure, assuage the agony of their grief. The Guardian joins in expressing sincerest sympathy.

MR. JOSEPH CAMPBELL field, was in Charlottetown last Saturday.

At Crapaud, P. E. Island, on Wednesday, February 8th, 1933, Joseph Campbell a highly respected citizen and Christian gentleman passed to his eternal reward. Deceased was a son of the late Hugh and Mary (Carruthers) Campbell of Searstown, P. E. Island, and was born there eighty-two years ago. He is survived by one brother, Dr. Thomas Campbell of Alberton, P. E. I. He married Miss Sarah Ann Dixon of Stanchele. Some years ago Mr. Campbell disposed of his property at Searstown and moved to Westmorland near Crapaud where he continued until his death. He had been in fairly good health until last summer and autumn when he began to fail. Medical skill and kind nursing failed to stay the growing weakness. As the body grew weaker his spiritual life was growing stronger, and those who were privileged to be with him were greatly comforted by his words of faith and love. Besides his wife he leaves two daughters, Myrtle Middleton, wife of Lorne Simmons, and Miss George C. both of Winthrop, Massachusetts, and who arrived home some days before their father passed away.

Mr. Campbell was a member of the Church of Scotland in this Province, and was strong in his christian convictions. His trust was in the finished work of Christ whom he loved and whose presence was to him the hope of glory.
