Several Mergers Expected in Newsprint Field

The Street seems to be fairly well convinced that one or two consolidations in the newsprint field may be announced. Such a move would of course be an indication of general confidence in the industry. Certain interests are attempting to combine several companies and before the year is out the merger movement is likely to go much further. These are not times when any paper company can make a go of it. The urge to merge is growing, and the lethargy of the stock market for paper stocks ought to help things along in sound fashion. Such mergers as take place are less apt now than formerly to be made with one eye cocked on the stock market.

For more than a year the leaders in the newsprint industry have endeavored to bring about some plan of stabilizing production so that it could be kept within reasonable bounds of the consumptive demand, and they have wrestled with their problem with a degree of unusual patience. Such efforts have proven effective to some extent if the story that the tonnage difficulties have been settled is correct. Apparently the guiding heads have at last realized that no matter how powerfully entrenched an industry may be, it cannot thrive or hold out continuously against a production which persists in outrunning demand; and that is just what is happening to the newsprint industry. The large companies can no longer keep working at 50, 60 or 70 per cent capacity while some of the independents are running at a much higher rate. Therefore further merger are logical.

Consolidated Gas

On account of the exceptionally large Canadian interest in Consolidated Gas the following comment is interesting.

While there was evidence of selling in Consolidated Gas as the general market weakened on Tuesday, report has it that he buying for the last week or more has been of the best character. The stock has been under steady accumulation, according to those who have followed the buying closely, and there are indications that it may be the account of one of the larger utility holding corporations. At any rate the buying is credited to broker who generally act for powerful banking interests the latter being closely affiliated with the Niagara Hudson Power Corporation.
