**BRITAIN DELIVERS**  
Countries as far apart as China, Iceland, Jamaica, the Malay Straits, Egypt, Finland, India, and the British West Indies all had X-ray and electro-medical apparatus shipped to them from a single British workshop last year. The quantity of apparatus installed was greater than ever before, except during 1923 when they supplied the Greek Army with a large fleet of mobile X-ray laboratories.

Iceland's recent shipment was dental X-ray apparatus. An X-ray and shortwave therapy apparatus went to the Civil Medical Hospital, Khartoum, and £10,000 worth of equipment to the radiological and therapy departments of the Public General Hospital, Kingston, Jamaica.

**London, Ont., Gives Nearly \$20,000 To Queen's Fund**  
Moving Appeal Published in The "Free Press"

Contributions from London, Ont., to the Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims are approaching \$20,000. At the end of last week, \$18,200 had been subscribed to the office of the London Free Press. It is a moving appeal recently published in the London Free Press.

**GIVE TO THE QUEEN'S FUND**  
"The wounded do not cry," wrote Quentin Reynolds, American war correspondent, returning to the United States after 15 months in Britain. He used those words as the title of his book of last week. It is an epigrammatic title encompassing in one sentence the faith of our own race under fire in home and factory, in city and on the farm, at sea, on the land, in the air.

Because they do not cry does not mean they are not hurt, that they do not suffer, that their agony is not great. No people ever suffered more than these people of Britain. No people ever complained less. No people ever deserved more.

But if the victims of German cruelty and lust to kill say little, there are those who stand in their place and tell the world proudly of their needs. For these grand men and women who stand in the front line of civilization are heroes all. Everyone — if he had his super-herman would wear a medal. Where all serve and all are brave, how is a man or a courageous woman to be chosen?

The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims stands and speaks for them. Throughout the British Commonwealth, in the self-governing dominions, in the colonies, in the mandates, the fund raises its appeal. Wherever the Jack float, there the fund sends its audience of the need of air raid victims in Britain, collects money and dispatches it to Britain.

In Canada the story of the fund is told daily from Halifax to Victoria in newspaper articles. In London and Western Ontario it is told in the London Free Press. Every reader knows how generously this appeal is being met, how young and old, men and women, children and the aged, rich and poor, have supported it. Wherever there is sympathy and imagination the fund has a friend.

British air raid victims are often left destitute. In one terrible hour they may lose home, clothing, all their material possessions. Perhaps they are also wounded—or killed. In any case they need help, help that is unstinted and whole-hearted. That is our job in Canada.

All money given in Canada to the Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims is sent overseas without charge, costs of the transfer having been supplied by Canadian financial houses. In Britain it is distributed through the Lord Mayor's Fund where it is most needed. In this way every dollar goes directly to the person most in need. The money from Canada goes to Britain—the hand of friendship.
