Cobb Defeats Ruth By 3-2 Margin 'Grudge' Match

NEWTON, Mass., June 25—(AP)—Ty Cobb, the scientific baseball immortal, called upon his time-finesse today to defeat the slobbering Babe Ruth, his fellow hall-of-famer, by a 3-2 margin in the opening round of their "grudge" charity golf match before a 2,000 gallery.

Cobb used his accurate putter to humble the Babe, despite the fact the 60-homer king out-drove him on every hole. Ruth's longer-range slugging off the tee put him two up when they reached the fourth hole. Here the more determined Ty rallied in such sturdy fashion that he reached the turn one up, even though he was 43 out, six over par, as was his opponent.

The first four of the inward holes were halved, then Cobb doubled his lead by blasting out of a trap to within three feet of the pin for his par-four on the 14th and he dropped a 10-foot putt on the 15th to extend his winning margin to three holes.

After halving the 16th, where the match officially ended, with par-threes, they played on to the home green in even fashion, Cobb winding up with a medal 81, nine over, to Ruth's 83.

Both admitted they were guilty of wretched golf, a fact obvious to the spectators from start to finish.

"This is a very poor round for me," Cobb apologized.

"What else can you do when you keep missing two-footers against a guy who can putt like Ty?" Ruth complained.

"I was very fortunate to win," Cobb added. "The Babe is a awfully nice fellow to play golf with when not in a baseball frame of mind. I guess I wasn't either. And that made it very pleasant."

Yanks Back On Top For Second Time This Year

NEW YORK, June 25—(AP)—An old and respected tenant, the New York Yankees, moved back into first place in the American League today by beating St. Louis Browns 7-5 while Cleveland Indians were losing to Boston Red Sox.

It was first time since the second week of the season that the Yankees had been on top of the circuit which they dominated for years and their new lease was based on a slender percentage margin, .503 to .597.

Joe DiMaggio hit his 16th home run of the year. It was the 37th consecutive game in which he has hit safely.

In Boston, the seven-hit pitching of Lefty Grove set back the Indians 7-2 for the 29th victory of his baseball career.

Always at his best in hot weather Grove was found for only one extra base hit—a double by Gerald Walker that led to the Indians' two runs in the fourth.

In Philadelphia, the Athletics won their second victory of the season over Detroit Tigers, sewing up a 5-4 decision by scoring three runs in the fourth inning.

Youthful Sid Hudson walked home one run in the 13th inning and was the victim of a triple steal as the White Sox defeated the Senators 2-0 at Washington.
