#### LIFT VEIL ON TOKYO BOMBING

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LUNENBURG, N. S., May 10 (CP)—Shipping circles said tonight a vessel shelled to destruction by an Axis U-boat on the Atlantic recently was believed to be the James E. Newsum, one of the last of the four-masted schooners which was owned here recently.

Less of the 23-year-old Newsum would make her the first schooner to be sunk by a submarine on this side of the Atlantic in this war. Several were sunk off the North American coast in the First Great War.

The four-sticker is believed to be the vessel from which eight Canadians and one West Indian, who were brought to Bermuda last week, escaped during a gunfire attack by a submarine. Bermuda dispatches said most of the Canadians were "believed" to be from Lunenburg.

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#### Raids Bring War Closer To India

NEW DELHI, India, May 10 (AP)—Japanese bombers prospectively for new fields of conquest raided Chittagong, eastern entryway into the industrial province of Bengal, Saturday for the second time in 24 hours, bringing relatively close to the great port of Calcutta the war that India has dreaded so long.

The raids were the third and fourth attacks of the war on the Indian mainland.

A high level bombing and machine gun attack upon Chittagong, which doubtless is among the early objectives of any advance into India proper. There was no confirmation, however, of vague axis reports that enemy raiders already have penetrated India.

While the Japanese jabbed at India's defenses from the air, British forces eluded the Japanese trap in Burma and took up positions in the mountains near the Indian frontier.

It was reported here today that Transport Minister Cardin had resigned because of the situation in which he was placed when the great majority of Quebec electors voted not to release the government from its pledge.

Mr. Cardin referred inquirers to Prime Minister Mackenzie King and did not deny the resignation report. Mr. King refused to comment.

#### Will Attend A. R. P. Course

Councillor B. Ernie MacDonald, Controller of Fire Services for the Charlottetown sub-committee, A.R.P., will leave next Saturday for Amherst College, Amherst, Massachusetts, to take an intensive training course of two weeks covering the technical phases of handling incendiary and high explosive bombs.

This was decided at a joint meeting of the Provincial A. R. P. Committee and the Charlottetown sub-committee. Hon. H. H. Cox presided.

This action was taken following the reading of a letter from George S. Mooney, executive secretary of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities, Montreal, in which Mr. Mooney conveyed an invitation from the Chemical Warfare Service of the United States War Department to Canadian municipalities to send representatives to take part in this training, which also includes dealing with gas, decontamination, etc., resulting from air raids.

A large number of city and towns from coast to coast in Canada have been asked to send two members each to attend the schools.

#### See Pipeline Only Solution For East

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—The proposal for an \$80,000,000 1,500-mile pipeline from Texas to the New York-Philadelphia area was again brought forward today with the contention it offers the principal hope for lifting motorists in the eastern United States from extremely short rations of gasoline and for assuring adequate oil for heating homes.

Government oil officials said petroleum co-ordinator Harold Ickes intends to submit to the war production board a bill which would give priority to the pipeline. He has been turned down twice.

OTTAWA, May 10 (CP)—Government action to alter the compulsory military service law is promised for this week—possibly tomorrow—and indications today were that it might be accompanied by resignation of a senior Quebec cabinet minister.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King has given notice of a bill to amend the National Resources Mobilization Act of 1940 and the general belief among observers in Ottawa is that it will remove the barrier to compulsory service outside the Dominion.

AIRWOMAN GRADUATES  
OTTAWA, May 9 (CP)—A group of airwomen—graduates of No. 7 Manning Depot of the Royal Canadian Air Force at adjoining Rockcliffe—were scheduled today to go on active service with the group of R.C.A.F. (Women's Division) posted to No. 3 Bombing and Gunnery School at Macdonald, Man.

Others will proceed for further training at the R. C. A. F. School of Technical Training at St. Thomas.

The airwomen were graduated yesterday from Rockcliffe Manning Depot, where they were inspected by Acting Squadron Leader K. O. Walker, O.C. No. 7 Depot. Among those completing their training were: Prince Edward Island—G. H. Craig, Charlottetown.

OTTAWA, May 10 (CP)—Setting of maximum wholesale and retail prices for bananas was announced tonight by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

The board ruled also that, effective tomorrow, all sales of bananas in Canada must be made by weight. The set prices are not specified. The ceiling is obtained by placing a limit upon the landed price and upon the markup which wholesalers and retailers may add to the landed price of the fruit.

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
