LENINE GOVERNMENT IS TRUE TO ALLIES

Says Russian Ambassador Elect to England. In an Interview in London Declares Lenine and Trotsky Doing More for Downfall of Kaiserism Than Allies in West.

(Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Jan. 4.—Development in the Russo-German negotiations are likely to lead to the recognition of the Lenine Government in Russia by the Allies.

NEXT BRITISH AMBASSADOR TO UNITED STATES.
