The annual meeting of the Cherry Valley Dairying Company was held in the Cherry Valley Schoolhouse on the 1st inst. President M. J. McLeod in the chair. The secretary's report of the past season included the following facts: Factory opened on June 1st, closed October 31st, milk supplied by forty-six patrons, total quantity of milk supplied, 550,373 pounds; total butter fat, 19,355.88 pounds; quantity of milk to make one pound of butter, 24.56 pounds; average percentage of fat in milk, 3.5; value of 100 pounds of milk to patrons, 74.09. The following is the board of directors elected for the ensuing year: Francis Mutch, McDonald, Charles Mutch, W. Carey and Reaney Jenkins, W. I. Young was re-elected auditor.
