Former Grand River Man Dies In Summerside. Citizens of Summerside and vicinity were shocked to learn of the sudden death yesterday morning of Neil A. MacDougall of St. Eleanor. He had complained of being ill the evening before and in the morning appeared to be better. He was taken to the Prince County Hospital and died a few minutes after he arrived there. Mr. MacDougall was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Roderick MacDougall of Grand River and was a veteran of the First World War, being severely wounded and losing an eye. After the war he held a number of city service appointments, including the position of Indian agent. At the time of his death he was employed at the R.C.A.F. station here. He was 47 years of age and is survived by his wife, the former Mrs. M. MacDougall of Summerside and nine children. Albin was in the R.C.A.F. in Ontario, Kathleen in Ottawa, Patricia in Summerside and Ernie, Lawrence, Erwin, John, Francis and Donald at home. There are also three brothers, Ed, in Champlain, Alta, in the army, Dr. James in Rumford, Maine, and one sister, Mrs. Harold MacDougall, in Champlain, Alta. Also a sister, Mrs. Michael Morrison, Grand River. Funeral arrangements had not been completed last evening.

something. He really thought the matter "should be attempted, for the City cannot pass up this matter." An English war-bride, a Mrs. Graham, said she hoped she would "have a place to live in this winter and that the City would do something quickly." Hon. T.W.L. Frowse said he was aware of the seriousness of the present housing situation in Charlottetown and that he was willing to do everything he could to furnish any decision the City Council might make regarding the matter. Mr. S. P. Paoli said he was in Montreal last week and had discussed the City's housing situation with building officials. One reason why contractors here were not getting building materials was because the Government was diverting it to cities whose needs were greater than those of Charlottetown. He informed the meeting that since the purchase of the dumpsite, the City Insurance Company was sending a man to Charlottetown next week to "work out a system for low rental housing." Mr. Paoli also stated that the Dominion Government was preparing a housing scheme which would allow houses to be put up at cost.

(Continued from Page 1) Coun. T.B. Rogers said the bolsters at the airport could be put in good shape in four or five days. The first meeting was to consider housing as well as slum clearance. Coun. Rogers said of 61 applications, 40 already made for living quarters at the airport, 40 of the applicants were in desperate need of quarters and something had to be done immediately.

"We can operate the airport," he said "if we should not delay in getting busy." Coun. MacDonald said he thought some real estate firm should take the project over.

Coun. Rogers, "It is a matter of doubt whether or not the Government would approve the taking over of such a project by private enterprise."

Coun. McKee said that on the basis of 60 families, one boiler would supply adequate heating. The officers' quarters, Coun. McKee said, contained 266 rooms and at the rentals proposed would bring in a revenue of \$2,920 a month.

Opposes Profit Idea. Recorder (K.M. Martin) - "Is it not a mistake to make any profit out of such a project? Charge enough in order not to lose money but if there is a surplus, make a rebate to the tenants in proportion to the amounts they paid for the project. He thought it was undesirable for any private organization to deal with the matter. There was a great demand for homes, especially suitable homes. Mr. Bentley thought the Dominion Govt. should "take a hand in this thing," but he had found that the Dominion Government took no responsibility, financially, "to house anybody". But people were asking for homes, Mr. Bentley said, and he thought the City would be well advised to go ahead with the project even if it meant a higher tax rate. "I would be willing to pay my share of the additional cost," Mr. Bentley said. No one knew what kind of winter was ahead, Mr. Bentley continued, and if there were unemployment so that some of the tenants could not pay, then the Provincial Government might "well be asked to pay

Trade Board Discusses Town Sewerage Problems

Other Questions Considered By Summerside Board of Trade.

The Summerside Board of Trade met last evening in the Town Hall with president Donald Baker presiding. A very good attendance of the members was noted and matters of considerable importance were discussed.

Reporting for the marine committee Mr. John Campbell referred to the wonderful heritage this Town has in its natural scenic beauty. It has one of the most beautiful harbors that one could find anywhere. It appeals in every way to the eye of the tourist, yet the authorities of this Town think that various sections of our waterfront should be made a dumping ground for every conceivable species of refuse. The authorities have provided sea walls at certain points but in between those points the dumpage which is allowed to collect causes an odor to rise to high heaven.

Mr. Campbell said that this has been going on for some years and that it has been intensified by the refuse which comes from the sewage outlet of the Dehydration plant. A foundation of a composting plant, which is being refused by the City, is being built and he stated his opinion that it was a "very big shame" that this condition should be allowed to exist. The

Barie MacDonald (chairman), R. B. Bell and Allen MacMillan. Before the appointment of the committees, City Clerk J. A. Fullerton suggested that since the airport project involved the City spending money outside the City's limits, citizens other than members of the Council should be included in the membership of the three committees.

Beef Cattle Prices. The matter of present prices on beef cattle was discussed by the Board and Mr. T.J. Inman of the agriculture committee stated that price conditions were not good. He said he knew of several cases where cattle could not be disposed of due to the existing low price which he believed was due to the present meat rationing system. It was felt that there was not much action the Board could take except perhaps to point local conditions out to the Government.

Mr. Campbell stated that during the reconstruction period it was the bounden duty of this Town to provide an incinerator to dispose of all refuse and protect the health of the people. Mr. George Keys of the Water and Sewerage Committee of the Town stated that the engineer, Mr. Waugh, had been investigating the matter of the congestion of the dehydrator plant sewer and his report stated that the plant was not using sufficient care in screening the refuse from the plant. The report claimed that if proper care was taken that the stoppages in the sewerage would not occur and would go through to the outlet and be carried away by the tide.

Mr. Baker, the president, stated his opinion that the Town should awake to the situation and provide proper sewerage and garbage disposal.
