"There are two factors contributing to this: first, the abnormally high percentage of insurance funds now invested in government bonds. The proportion of total assets invested in low interest bearing Dominion Government bonds, has risen from 35.4% (for all Canadian companies except one) to over 40% in the past fifteen years. Second, and much more important, the policy of low interest rates put into effect by the Federal Government through the instrumentality of the Bank of Canada."

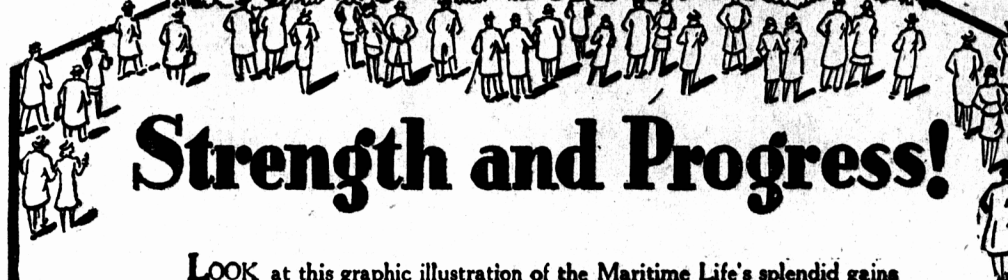
