**SOLDIERS CHANGE JOBS ON THEIR RETURN**

The special correspondent of the Toronto Globe at Ottawa, in an analysis of the nature of the occupations sought for by returned men, says that one man in every five soldiers of Canada's expeditionary army indicated a desire to change his job in his answers to the questionnaire, distributed throughout the active forces since the armistice, by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment. In other words, 52,500, out of 273,144 soldiers, that filled out their cards want to improve their station in life.

It was found that 87,771 men desire to engage in pursuits connected with agriculture and stockraising. Of

that number 72,218 had been so employed previously, but of these 4,716 wish to take up other avocations.

As 20,269 expressed the desire, however, to get on the land instead of resuming their previous callings, agriculture on the basis of these cards would get 15,553 new recruits.
