HOW BRITAIN WILL PAY

LONDON, March 6.—Stanley Baldwin, Chancellor of the Exchequer, replying to a questioner in the House today, said that on the basis of the sixty-two year term for paying the debt to the United States, the payments on the debt would be as follows:

An immediate cash payment of \$4,128,086; an annual payment of \$1,000,000 for ten years, an annual payment of \$184,000,000 for fifty years and a final payment of \$118,481,330, or an aggregate of \$2,246,000,000 at par of exchange, and 4 per cent. more at 4.68.

These figures, he said had no meaning, except in relation to the 62-year term. If Great Britain paid more speedily, then the aggregate would be reduced.

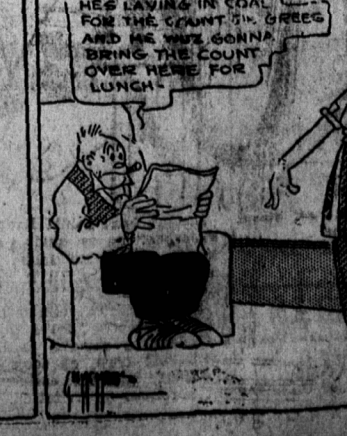
